#### My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today our Church celebrates the Feast of Epiphany. Growing up, I always understood this to be the "end of the Christmas Season". This makes sense for many



reasons: it speaks of God's manifestation to humanity in Christ, it highlights the appearance of the Magi, and it is a bit of a "birthday party" for Jesus. How wrong I was! The Christmas Season actually/officially ends with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. This makes infinitely more sense! After all, our entrance into the Church isn't marked by our birth but by our baptism. The Baptism of Jesus, about which we will read at tomorrow's liturgy, begins Jesus' entrance into "public" ministry. It is His "coming out party" as it were.

Now back to today's feast. The Feast of the Epiphany, a word which has its roots in the Greek word "ephiphaneia", which means "manifestation", marks and celebrates the appearance of the Magi upon the scene of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem. In the classic Greek it was used to mark the appearance of gods. Of course, in our monotheistic tradition, this is adapted to mark the appearance of the One True God in the Person of Jesus Christ. The first reference in Christian literature to the Epiphany would be in the 4<sup>th</sup> century, which speaks of Jesus' "birth, that is, His Epiphany" by St. Epiphanius of Salmis in his work "Panarion" (written in 361). It was celebrated on January 6<sup>th</sup> for the longest time, and currently is celebrated on the Sunday between January 2<sup>nd</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> (thus the short "down time" this year between Christmas and Epiphany).

I can always remember the Feast of the Epiphany for the traditions we held in our household. We would set up the crèche on Christmas Eve (minus the Baby Jesus, of course!), placing Baby Jesus in the manger when we returned home from Midnight Mass. On Christmas Day, the Magi would make their appearance, but not at the manger – they would be placed on the kitchen counter! Over the next week or so, they would slowly be moved from the counter, to the stovetop, to the back of the couch and finally into the manger scene. This, of course, gave each of the five children a chance to "relocate" the Magi. The Magi were three in number (as in the song "We Three Kings"?); this, we later came to find out, was probably not entirely accurate. We came to find, through investigation, that there were as many as a dozen "magi", which is, not coincidentally, related to our modern word, "magic". The Magi were a class of palace workers who were part magician, part alchemist, part astrologer (thus their knowledge of, and reliance on, stars for guidance). They were "jacks of all trade" (although "jacks" may be a bit of a misnomer, as there may have been some women in their company), relied on by the king (such as Herod) for guidance and direction for many things.


The Feast of the Epiphany gives us an opportunity for a "breather" (albeit a small one this year!) between Christmas and the Baptism of the Lord. May we, like the Magi, come to the manger and reflect on the good things God has provided for us – namely, Christ the Lord.

#### **Penances and Prayers**

God's glory, now, is kindled gentler than candlelight under the rafters of a barn: Eternal Peace is sleeping in the hay, And Wisdom's born in secret in a straw-roofed stable.\*

When I was younger, I wrote music to and recorded Thomas Merton's poem, "Epiphany Carol." If you have never read it, search it out on the internet. Merton's words are profound and paint a picture of the awesomeness of Jesus, the newborn King of Kings, lying in a simple straw bed. The shepherds and Wise Men are drawn to pay homage to the One who has been born above all others and brings with him hope for a broken world.

As Merton correctly points out, the gifts we are called to bring to this baby and lay at his feet are our prayers and penances, next to those gifts of worldly wealth. What is it that you have to bring to the stable on this feast of the Epiphany of the Lord? Unless those prayers and penances lead to a new way of living, our gifts will be void of meaning. What we lay before him speaks to the change in us that he has given to us by his birth. Our daily stewardship is resembled in those gifts. If we are to truly echo the kingdom of God in our lives and actions, what we ultimately offer to him is no less than our entire selves. This baby will give his entire self for us, and his work must continue through our hands and feet.

While we unnumbered children of the wicked centuries Come after with our penances and prayers, And lay them down in the sweet-smelling hay Beside the wise men's golden jars.\*


