

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Over the past few days, a multitude of committed Christians (over 650,000) embarked on a journey of faith to Washington,



D.C. Their purpose is a solemn and important one, one which we have had to undertake for almost four decades now. It is the "March For Life" and it is an event which highlights the need for us to be a "light to the nations". It is a rally which will bring together rich and poor, young and old, men, women and children. The "binding force" which links us all (marchers and prayers, alike) together is our unwavering commitment to the defense of life for the pre-born, one of the most vulnerable groups among us. While a milestone event took place recently (with the overturning of "Roe v. Wade" by the Supreme Court), there is still much work to be done in defense of those of who have no one to speak for them. We take courage, however, in the fact that we have made a difference, one mind and heart at a time. I know in my own conversations with people over the years, I have seen many folks come to a moment of conversion. This is done not by me, but through me and by the grace of God.

Today's gospel highlights the need for us to see that we are all called by God. Often times, we look at the gospel proclaimed today as a call for more to enter into the priesthood. That "call" is certainly there, but implicit in this passage is the fact that we are all called by God to "fish" for men and women receptive (and, perhaps, not so receptive (at first)) to God's call to them to respond to their baptismal call to serve God and His people in the Church and in the world. It begins, however, in our own heart and mind. We cannot convincingly call others to conversion, to a new way of thinking about and looking at life, if we don't first believe it. We can "talk the talk", using words such as "discipleship" and "ministry". If we don't believe and live what we are saying, however, then it is just that – talk – and our words ring hollow. We must first believe, and then live, what we have heard, letting them "take root" in our own minds and hearts.

Jesus, in this encounter by the seashore, begins to assemble "the twelve". In calling Simon, Andrew, James and John, Jesus's call is sure. The disciples' response, for their part, is immediate. What courage it must have taken for them to respond so quickly and surely; what faith it must have taken to leave all that they knew to follow Jesus. Jesus isn't calling us, necessarily, to leave all that we know. Sometimes it's best to "grow where you're planted", responding to God's call wherever you are. Our response, however, must be as bold as the disciples' was, for it is a bold thing to profess one's faith publicly. May we have the openness to hear God's call. May we have the boldness to respond with surety. May we speak to others about our faith with courage and conviction. May all come to know, through our words, given to us by the Holy Spirit, what we have come to know: that Jesus Christ has broken the chains of sin and death, and won for us newness of life!

Drop Your Nets and Be Free

There are times I wish I had no obligations. It would be great to take my wife's hand, hop in the car, and drive into the sunset. Where we were going would not matter as much as the fact that we would have nowhere we *had* to be. There would be nothing we *had* to do. No bills. No commitments. No problems. *Freedom*!

Life doesn't work like that, however. When Jesus came along and asked some fishermen to drop their nets and follow him, they did just that. Wow! In some ways, they experienced true freedom. That is what Jesus offers all of us. Yet, true freedom looks quite different than my dream scenario.

In living in the true freedom that Jesus offers, there are things we must do and places we must go. That is because freedom only exists in following God's will, not our own. We are called to be and called to give ourselves completely to God without reservations. We always have the free will to not respond to His call, but we will find that a negative answer may complicate our lives even further. God's path for us calls on us to give freely of what we have been given. Saying no to that call means we carry the weight of those gifts. We were never meant to keep them. The path of God's will may seem long and winding, but it is the one that leads us into that sunset. It is the way to true freedom.

So the NFL season is almost over. Only the Super Bowl remains. For some fans, the season is already over since their team is now sitting at home. It is amazing the allegiance some people have to their teams. Some people bleed Green Bay green and yellow or believe the only team is supposedly America's team, the Dallas Cowboys. Of course, if you are reading this outside the States, perhaps you live and breathe a team like the New Zealand All Blacks or the Calgary Flames.

In the early church, people took their allegiance to certain leaders to an extreme. Paul chastised them for thinking that the baptism of one community or the teachings of a certain leader were superior to the anything else in this new movement of Jesus followers. He reminded them that there is to be no division in Christ and that all things flow from Christ, not from the leaders in the community. Those who follow Jesus are one body of Christ: a place where there is no room for competition or condescension.

Sometime our stewardship efforts in a parish become all about the parish. We seek to get people to do more stuff and give more money and we lose sight of why we live a stewardship way of life in the first place: Jesus. It is wonderful to watch our parishes grow into more vibrant communities that lead people to Jesus. We should rejoice to be in such a parish family. But one day there will be no parishes and those who have received his gifts freely and have followed him will live with Christ as one forever. In your stewardship, always keep Jesus as *the main thing*.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



Today's gospel relates the "call" of the men who would become not only "disciples" (i.e., followers of Jesus) but "Apostles" ("one who is

sent", in this case by Christ) of Jesus. We may look at today's gospel and think of this call as "one-and-done", but the truth of the matter is that the conversion of the Apostles, which followed their initial invitation to follow Jesus, happened over the course of their lives and deepened with each miracle event, sermon, and encounter with Jesus.

If you are a regular reader of this column, you've heard of the conversion of St. Francis and his subsequent mission to "rebuild the church". In both of these instances, neither of these events in Francis' life were "one-time events". They happened as a "moment of faith" in Francis' life, but they both unfolded over time. Much like the Apostles of Jesus, we can look at Francis' conversion and mission as encounters with Jesus which shaped most of Francis' adult life and see that Jesus continued to reveal Himself to Francis in both profound and simple ways.

Like most of us, God reveals Himself in many of these profound and simple ways. For Francis, the encounter with the leper, the call emanating from the San Damiano Cross, his break from his father (and, really, his former way of life), his forming of the Franciscan Order, and his reception of the Stigmata all point to an ever-deepening relationship with the Lord. May we come to encounter the Lord in profound and simple ways. May we, like Francis, be open to hearing the voice and seeing the face of Christ in our lives. May we respond to these encounters with the love, passion, and zeal with which Francis did.






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
