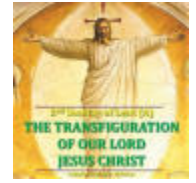

My Dear Friends in Christ,



I’ve never been a firm believer that God does things to “test” us. Today’s readings, however, seem to be an “exception to the rule”. Our reading from the Old Testament speaks of the encounter Abraham has with God in relation to his son, Isaac. God appears to be testing Abraham to see to what lengths he will go in showing his love and fidelity to God. In the end, however, it is less about the test than it is about the fidelity. God ultimately rewards Abraham for going so far as to be willing to sacrifice his only son (sound familiar?), promising to make his descendants as “countless as the stars of the sky and the sands of the seashore” (Gn 22:17). Such are the lengths that we are to go in showing our faithfulness to God.

In our second reading, we are reminded that in sacrificing His Son for us, God shows us that He will give us all the things we need to grow in faith, hope and love. It may seem at times, however, that we are “tested” in this exchange (God giving us life, we giving ourselves) by trusting that God has the “big picture” in His mind and heart, keeping us safe from charges and condemnation from the world. We are to always realize that we owe the world nothing – it is God to whom we owe everything, including our very lives.

In the gospel passage from Mark, we are given the encounter of the Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor that Jesus has, first with His disciples and then Elijah and Moses. The disciples that are with Jesus are given charge “not to relate what they had seen to anyone” (Mk 9:9) until the Resurrection. What a test this is! How could they not tell anyone and everyone of what they had seen, heard and felt? How challenging it must have been for them! When we reflect on this encounter, we must ask how it is that we encounter Jesus. Do we see Him as “transfigured” (as the disciples did that day), or do we take Him for granted thinking that we can always “have” Him? The challenge in the Transfiguration, for the disciples and for us, is to see the mission of Christ without losing sight of the power and majesty of Christ. Jesus came as the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets (this is the reason for the presence of Moses (Law) and Elijah (Prophets)).

May we always know that when we feel “tested” by God, that there is a good reason for this. We should do our best to see the “big picture” that God has in mind for us and for the world. We must never lose sight that Jesus constantly reveals Himself to us, in Word and deed, pointing the way to the Kingdom. May the Christ we encounter today be the Christ we encounter everyday, in His promise, power and peace.

WHAT ARE YOU DOING FOR LENT?

A lot of us are feeling small these days. Insignificant, inconsequential in the face of the pandemic and overwhelming economic distress. And then comes Lent, and this year it somehow feels both irrelevant and trivial to consider doing without chocolate for 40 days.

Fasting is one of the three cornerstones of the season, but we're all exhausted by a year of giving up so much. Yet it's possible that we're partially at fault for that exhaustion, because even as we lost incomes, fellowship, access to the myriad things that were so important to us, we've also added in too much. Too much stress. Too much obsession with the news. Too many hours on

Pope Francis this year invites us to remember why we're here. "Fasting," he writes, "involves being freed from all that weighs us down—like consumerism or an excess of information, whether true or false—in order to open the doors of our hearts to the One who comes to us, poor in all things, yet 'full of grace and truth': the Son of God our Savior."

Instead of over-indulging in all the negatives that we've come to ingest as easily as once upon a time we indulged in chocolates, the pope has a different suggestion: "In embracing the experience of poverty," he says, "those who fast make themselves poor with the poor and accumulate the treasure of a love both received and shared."

There are so *many* opportunities this year to "embrace the experience of poverty," as more and more families have gone without, are subsisting on unemployment and food banks and soup kitchens. This year more than any year, we are called to

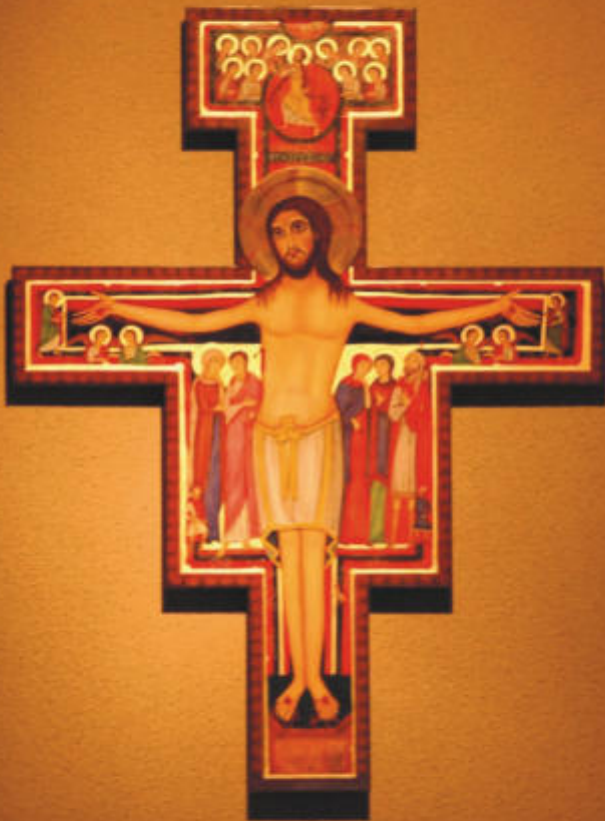

When Sacrifice Becomes Mundane Tracy Earl Welliver

It seems to happen every year, like clockwork: we drag a bit, as we enter into the second week of Lent. On Ash Wednesday, we feel a bit like soldiers banging our shields, rushing into battle. "We're ready, God!" our hearts cry out. "Transform us through sacrifice! Your will be done!"

But by now, these Lenten resolutions are no longer novelties — they've joined the ranks of everyday inconveniences, which somehow are the hardest to bear. Because transformation, in real life, happens in inches, just as a battle is won slowly in the crash of one sword against another. It's not always a dramatic thing, to the naked eye. It's the perseverance in prayer despite weariness, or the continual denial of some pleasure even though there's that nagging voice in our minds saying: *go ahead, God doesn't really mind.*

It's a week when we all need a shock to the system — and wouldn't you know it, this Sunday God gives us a double-whammy of dramatic sacrificial scenes. We picture Abraham, who also cried "Ready!" when God called, never imagining what He would ask: the surrender of his long-awaited son. We see Christ himself transfigured, as God shows us what He is ready to give up for love of us.

We must remain committed, persevering daily in acknowledging that everything belongs to God. What we sacrifice, we simply give back to Him.

If God is for us, who can be against us? Can we still reply, "Ready!" when we hear the call of God? MTS

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
