
Cardinal Sean encourages Catholics to participate in the daily and Sunday Masses broadcast from the Catholic TV chapel.

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today the Church celebrates

"Lactare Sunday". The word "lactare" is taken from the Latin and means to "rejoice", which may seem strange to us during this Lenten Season. This designation comes into play, however, when we recognize that we are very close to the celebration of the Easter, and there is "cause for rejoicing here". Today's readings bear this out as well.

Today's first reading speaks of the anointing of David as king. Samuel, in being sent by God, is prompted by God to anoint David. David's other brothers may seem, on the surface, to be more "qualified" to assume the role of king, but God sees beyond the surface. In anointing David, God shows that He "sees" us in a different way than we might see ourselves or others. In looking at the kingship of David (of which Jesus is "in line"), one sees that being anointed is no guarantee to perfection – which is good news for us, indeed! God shows to us that He "anoints" in a different way than society does.

Our second reading speaks of the second "theme" (of three) through which we walk with our RCIA candidates, that of "light". We are called to walk in the light of Christ, for we are "children of light" (Eph 5:8). This might seem easy, for walking in light is much easier, safer and comforting than walking in darkness. Sometimes we might be drawn to darkness, however, because things in darkness are seemingly hidden. I say "seemingly", for God sees all, which is a good thing as God can help us move from darkness into light.

Our gospel brings forth this idea of "light" in a different way, with the story of the man born blind. This is a physical blindness, but it is tied into the spiritual realm by the fact that in Jesus' day sin and illness had a direct "linkage". When one was ill or disabled, one was seen as being "born totally in sin" (as the Pharisees say in Jn 9:34); we know this not to be the case now, partly due to the actions of SJesus, who has no issue with healing the man. In "schooling" the Pharisees, helps us by teaching us to look beyond what is "seen" with the eye and to "see" with the heart. When we do this, we see as God sees.

Let us be people of the light, walking in the light of Christ. Let us follow the Lord in the light of His truth and love. Let us come to know Jesus and live in the light of life!



Friday's during Lent, St. John's will have a 6:30 AM Mass As well as the 9:00 AM. BRAINTREE -- The Pastoral Center's Bethany Chapel was full to capacity as Cardinal Seán P. O'Malley led the celebration of Ash Wednesday Mass on Feb. 26.

Cardinal O'Malley delivered his homily before the distribution of ashes. Looking at the reading from Matthew's Gospel, in which Jesus talks about prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, the cardinal spoke about the importance of motives that prompt religious acts.

"The Pharisees were great at public prayer, fasting and almsgiving. But it was more a case of spiritual one-upmanship than an act of penance. Jesus is urging us to look at our motives and to avoid temptation to do religious acts in order to increase our prestige," Cardinal O'Malley said.

He said that the human tendency to keep up appearances can undercut the true purpose of religious acts, which is to grow closer to God.

"Acts of piety have to be done with the proper inner attitude or they don't adhere to their purpose, and our only real reward will be the passing notice of people rather than growing closer to our God," he said.

He spoke about how Lent can be "reduced" to a time of setting health-related goals, such as improved diet or increased exercise.

"These acts of discipline can be spiritually beneficial if they help us to overcome our self-indulgence and unhealthy behavior. But the success of our Lent cannot be measured by the number of pounds we lose or how many steps we take each day," Cardinal O'Malley said.

He suggested that fasting be coupled with almsgiving, using the resources that would go toward one's own comfort to instead help the poor. He also said that Lent is a good time to examine one's prayer life and seek reconciliation in relationships.

In closing, Cardinal O'Malley explained the symbolism of the ashes, which "betoken the fragility of life," and the sign of the cross, which indicates that "the dust has been redeemed by the loving sacrifice of Jesus Christ."

"Ash Wednesday is not meant to be a morbid reflection on death, but a serious reminder that life is always short and we must be good stewards of the time, talent and treasure that we have received," he said.
