

# NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today the Church, on this Fourth Sunday of Lent, "Laetare Sunday". This designation marks the (approximate) halfway point of our Lenten Season/Journey. I once came across a little (adapted) poem that speaks of this:



Roses are red, Violets are blue, The vestments are pink, So Lent is halfway through.

A silly rhyme? Perhaps. But it gets the point across that we are at the mid-point of our Lenten journey. It also points out the fact that we have the option, and are encouraged, to break out the rose colored vestments, as the word "Laetare" means "rejoice and rose is the liturgical color for rejoicing. But what are we rejoicing? Are we celebrating the fact that we have made it halfway through Lent and are still able to say that we have kept our Lenten sacrifice intact (which I hope you can say!)? Or, are we celebrating the fact that we are halfway towards celebrating the Paschal Mystery?

Today's gospel ends in celebration, although it certainly doesn't begin in that fashion. Jesus is giving a lesson to the Pharisees and scribes about welcoming the sinner (something with which the authorities of Jesus' day had a problem), and He uses the "Parable of the Prodigal Son". As we know, Jesus often spoke in parables, using them to teach a greater lesson. In the story of the Prodigal Son, a landowner's son wishes to receive his share of the property now (before the father's death); the father gives in to this request, much to his dismay I would imagine. After squandering the riches, and encountering a famine, the son comes to his senses. The son, however, is hesitant to approach the father, feeling unworthy to come home. After practicing what he will say (comparing himself to a hired hand, unworthy of anything more in the father's eyes), he makes his way home. The father does not even wait for his son's speech, embracing and kissing him, thankful to have him home. He sets about to have a celebration for this prodigal son. It is at this point that the elder ("faithful") son hears the revelry and inquires as to the cause. When the elder son is told that his brother has returned and the father has put together a celebration, the son refuses to enter the party. This elder son has been loyal, and is upset that nothing has been done to reward this loyalty. The father tries to convince the (elder) son to join the celebration because this "brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found" (Lk 15:32). We do not know the outcome of this conversation with father and son; one would hope that the elder son would join the celebration.

Where are you in this story? Are you the prodigal son, looking for a way home? Are you the father, praying for your children to return to their (biological or faith) family? Are you the elder (and loyal) son, resentful of those who have come into the family after turning their back on them? Wherever we find ourselves, let us rejoice that God is with us on our journey of faith – ready to restore our hope, renew our life, or reward our fidelity.


#### **Tenebrae**

#### **MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY**

Today's gospel features the parable of "The Prodigal Son". In this story, Jesus relates how

the young son who seeks to come home after squandering his share of his father's fortune on "wine, women, and song", so to speak. In being welcomed home, the Prodigal Son regains his place in his father's house. By way of this parable, Jesus shows us that we are always welcome "home" when we show contritions for our erring ways and seek forgiveness for our past sins.

St. Francis, much like the Prodigal Son, took his share of the family fortune "on the road" and sought his fame in the world by emulating the knights about whom he heard in the troubadour's songs while traveling to markets in France with his father. Fueled by these stories, Francis looked to make his mark in the world by attaining the status of the "majore" (the "upper class", that is) by working in the "family business" as a cloth merchant. It was while working there that Francis' life began to change. During this time, while busy in the family store, a poor beggar came in asking for help. Francis dismissed him and returned to work, yet the affair ate at him. He realized his courteousness extended only to his peers and noble folk. Contrite, he swore to show chivalry to everyone regardless of class and so ran after the beggar to make up for refusing alms.

But there were limits. Chivalry did not offset Francis' aversion to physical or social ugliness – and nothing was more revolting than the lepers. He avoided these outcasts whose outward deformities were considered an expression of an inward spiritual or moral deformation. Francis would hold his nose as he ran away from them. Courtesy and manner only went so far. But this changed one day on the road, where he encountered one of these lepers. Having moved on from the family business to that of seeking his fame as a knight, Francis saw, and was (as usual) repulsed by a leper. At that moment, something stirred in his heart (the Holy Spirit, perhaps?) and he had a conversion of mind, heart, life. He went back, kissed the leper...and his life was forever changed.

Francis went home, encountered his (biological) father, renounced his wealth, and sought entrance into his Father's House. Not his earthly father, but his Heavenly Father. At this moment, Francis "the Prodigal Son", came home. And the rest, as they say, is history. May we seek entrance into Our Father's House by changing our ways that are not of God and realigning our mind, heart, and life towards the Father. May we use this Lenten journey to unite ourselves with the Eternal Kingdom by building up the Kingdom of God here on earth, so that we may (one day) share in the fullness of life of the Kingdom in Heaven.
