



MASSES FOR THE WEEK

My Dear Friends in Christ,

My mother was a great gardener; she could take any plant, any flowering thing and bring it back to life. She had the ultimate "green thumb". One day, I saw



her taking perfectly good, growing flowers and cutting the tops of them clear off! She then explained to me the concept of "pruning", of trimming the heads of flowers to help them grow back stronger and more vibrant than before. It is something, I must admit, remains a bit of a "mystery" to me!

Once again in the gospel, Jesus uses a very "earthy" image to convey His relationship with us. Last week, if you recall, it was Jesus as "the Good Shepherd". On this week, Jesus uses the image of "the vine and the branches". In speaking in this way, Jesus conveys the fact that He gives life, and life abundantly. Just as the "branches" cannot live without the nutrients which come from the "vine", we cannot live without the "nourishment" which comes from Jesus. There are times, as well, when we as "branches" need to be "pruned". It may feel like the type of pruning which my mother's flowers received that seemed so foreign to me but which, in the end, we come to realize that it was necessary for our growth.

It was this type of "pruning" that St. Paul received at God's hands. As most know the story, Paul (then known as Saul of Tarsus) made his living as a lawyer prosecuting (persecuting, really) Christians. It would seem unlikely that God would use such a person to do His work, yet that is exactly what God did. When one thinks about it, Saul/Paul is exactly the type of person God would use to get His message across – after all, who better to promote Christianity than one who used to actively work against it? The conversion of Paul is one of the great "lessons" God offers us in not seeing mere appearance, but seeing into the heart of a person. Paul is symbolic of the power of God at work in the world.

As we move through the Easter Season, let us continue to work towards promoting, protecting and defending Gospel values. Let us help others to see the beauty in the faith, a beauty which transcends all time and brings to us God – the God of both the Eternal and the Eternal Now (the present age which is situated in eternity).

The Teen Mass will resume in the fall.


May Sandwich Making for Capuchin Mobile Ministries

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY

When one thinks of St. Francis, one can't help but how "grounded" he was, both spiritually and physically. While he was certainly "rooted" in the spiritual life, he was very much "one with nature" when it came to our physical selves. St. Francis' theology was Incarnational, meaning that it was rooted in the Body of Christ – both Christ's physical self and the Church as the "living Body of Christ". He would recognize the imagery used in today's gospel, that of the "vine and the branches" as both physical manifestation of our relationship with Christ and the spiritual bond that we have with Christ.

In the image of the vine and the branches, Jesus reminds us that we (the branches) can do nothing apart from Christ (the vine). St. Francis would see this imagery, no doubt, as a clarion call to be one with Christ. He would further see it as a reality that if we become one with Christ, just as the vine and the branches are one (plant), then we can bear great fruit. If we allow ourselves to be separated from the vine, we risk losing our "lifeline". In unifying ourselves with Christ, we remain in Him and He in us.

Throughout St. Francis' mission and ministry, He relied on Christ to be that "eternal life support", apart from which he could do nothing. He was constantly being "fed" by Jesus, both in Word and in Sacrament. We are much the same. Apart from Christ (the vine) we (the branches) can do nothing, and we are fed in the same way, and with the same elements, as St. Francis himself was. I was just recently speaking with a friend of mine and I mentioned to her that without Christ we can do nothing, but with Christ "all things are possible" (Matthew 19:26).

May we rely on Christ just as St. Francis did. May we come to know Jesus as the "vine" and we as the "branches", so that we may be fed by Him in Word and in Sacrament.

Branching Out Isn't Always What It's Cracked Up to Be

"That's a really beautiful tree branch. Man, would you look at the bark on that thing? The others are real duds, but that low-hanging branch has really got it all together."

I've never heard anyone say this. Maybe I just need to hang out with more arborists, but I can't recall ever hearing someone admire the particular beauty of a single branch. When someone comments on a tree, it's usually the whole tree — perhaps a visual element of it, like the color of the leaves or its height. But people don't usually zero in on one branch.

Maybe that's because usually, if one branch is looking a little weak, chances are every other branch is, too.

The Bible tells us that when we bear fruit as good everyday stewards, it is for the Father's glory. We are the branch on His magnificent tree. What we have is from Him, and what we do likewise points back to Him. We also tend to reflect how well the other branches around us are incorporating the nutrients coming their way. That's all fine and good in theory. In practice, it can be an arduous exercise in humility.

When I do something virtuous or charitable or kind, there is a part of me that wants to stand out for it. I think that's true for all of us. We've given of ourselves in some way or overcome some human temptation to accomplish a little bit of good in this world, and even though we know God sees us, we'd really love for everyone else to see it, too.

It's a struggle, for sure. But we need to remember that our fruit belongs to the whole tree.

"Cribs" will be set up on April 6 at both St Ann and St John Parish. Donations will be accepted through May 5!



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


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
