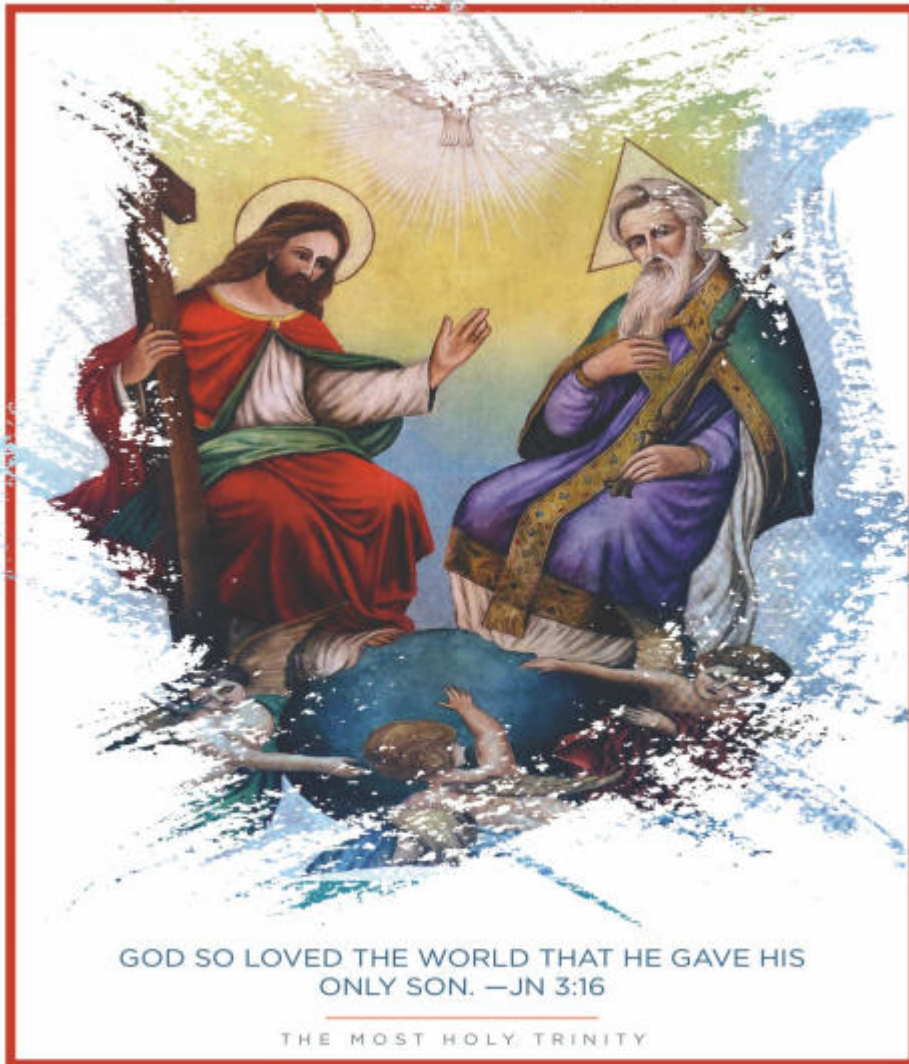

Today the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, more commonly known as Trinity Sunday. It is a feast which has its roots in the early church and was very much a response to the Arian heresy which spread around the mid-fourth century. Arius, a Christian presbyter in Alexandria, held that the Son was subordinate to the Father and Spirit in the Trinity, that He held a lower place. This heresy, along with Arius himself, was condemned in both the Council of Nicaea (325) and Constantinople (381). It was at these Councils that the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed, as we say it today, was created and promulgated throughout the Church.

One might understand Arius' confusion, for the concept of the Trinity is a difficult one to fathom. I believe that the key to Trinity isn't so much "understanding" as it is "faithfulness". While one might seek to "figure out" what the Trinity is all about, one might be better served trying to "enter into" the Trinity. If one can strive to "live" the Trinity, one might come to "knowledge" of it. If one can look at the creative aspects of the Father, the redemptive aspects of the Son and the sanctifying aspects of the Spirit, then one can be better served by, and better serve, the Trinity.

The key to understanding the Trinity comes in how we live our lives of faith. There are times when we rely upon, when we call upon, the different "persons" of the Trinity. These aspects of God are made all the more powerful when we realize that when we ask for the revelation of the Father, the friendship of the Son or the gifts of the Spirit, we are not abandoning the other "persons". There is only One God, no matter upon whom we call for aid and assistance. This is a key element of the Trinity, one which was missed by Arius. In "demoting" the Son to second-class status below the Father and Spirit, Arius was (perhaps inadvertently) limiting God. God is always at work – in our lives, in the lives of the Church and in the world. God is always creating, redeeming and sanctifying.

May we, as we move from the Easter Season into Ordinary Time, come to see the movement of God as ONE, just as God is ONE. May we know that whomever it is we call upon for intercession, assistance, guidance or aid, that God is always with us, at all times and in all seasons. May we help others to know this truth and may we share it with all whom we meet.

My Dear Friends in Christ,

I'm sure that you've seen that news outlets are reporting this morning that Houses of Worship in Massachusetts will be allowed to open as part of "Phase 1" of the "reopening" of the Commonwealth. To that end, I have listened to Governor Baker's press conference and I am sitting in on a webinar from the Archdiocese tomorrow afternoon, as well as receiving information regarding this phased reopening, both of the Commonwealth in general and the churches of the Archdiocese in particular

Since Easter—and the weeks before while we've been staying at home—we have been, so to speak, in an Upper Room with the world.

Praying. Hoping. Wondering. Anticipating. Not knowing...

Waiting for the Spirit of Jesus, the re-creating Spirit, the renewing Spirit, the only One who can renew the face of the earth.

Last Sunday we celebrated Pentecost and many parishes came together to celebrate Mass for the first time.

How fitting it was, on the Solemnity of Pentecost, that we broke bread together once more! This mystery, as Pope Benedict has said, "constitutes the mystery of the Church; it is an event that gave her, so to say, her initial form and the zeal for her mission."

The intimacy of the arrival of the Spirit, manifested in tongues of fire above the heads of the apostles and of Mary, pushes them out with the courageous and bold proclamation of the Lord Jesus Christ's death and resurrection. All those in Jerusalem that day, though each spoke different languages, understood clearly the message of salvation.

We rejoice that gradually we can gather together more closely in a public way—with our social distancing in place—only in order to be, like the apostles, sent to proclaim the good news that God is gathering us all together. In the midst of fractured conversations and broken promises, of fear, conflicts, and aggressive, unsociable discourse, Pentecost calls us to unity, to dialogue.

The ability to bring unity and hope, to dialogue with those of different views, and to foster a culture of encounter is the fruit of the Spirit, the unfolding of holiness in the world.

Let this Pentecost be not only a celebration of coming together again in our houses of worship, celebrating the Liturgy together with our parish communities, but also a moment when we feel ourselves pushed forward by the Spirit to become the beacons of unity and the lighthouses of hope in the world's new normal. How the whole human family needs your witness. Let yourself on Pentecost be filled with the Holy Spirit!

"Only with the gift of God's Spirit can there be unity. This Spirit will give us a new heart and a new tongue, a new capacity to communicate. And this is what happened on Pentecost.... At Pentecost, where there was division and estrangement, unity and understanding were born" (Pope Benedict, Pentecost Homily, 2011).

REST IN THE LORD'S LOVE TONIGHT

Take a few moments to become aware of God's presence. Close your eyes and take a few deep breaths, remembering that in this very moment you are under the gaze of God, who knows and loves you totally.

Bring to mind something that you will face in this upcoming week. It could be something that you're excited, worried, or unsure about. It could be an event, a relationship, a problem, a task, or responsibility. It could be anything.

A reading from the Word of God:

Love is patient, love is kind, and is not jealous; love does not brag and is not arrogant, does not act unbecomingly; it does not seek its own [will], is not provoked, does not take into account a wrong suffered, does not rejoice in unrighteousness, but rejoices with the truth; bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. (1 Cor. 13:1ff)

Ask yourself: How is God inviting me to live this week?

Notice what arises within you. It could be a feeling, an image, a word, a memory, anything.

Slow down and wait for this feeling, image, or word to become clearer for you. Become fully aware of it and sit with it for a few moments.

Then, in the sanctuary of your baptized soul (which is the temple of the Holy Spirit) **speak to that Divine Spirit**, saying to Him: O Holy Spirit, beloved of my soul, I adore You. Enlighten me, guide me, strengthen me, console me. Tell me what I should do; give me Your orders. I promise to submit myself to all that You desire of me and to accept all that You permit to happen to me. Let me only know Your Will.
(Cardinal Mercier's Prayer to the Holy Spirit)

After a few moments of stillness, return to the situation under consideration and see how it may have shifted, even subtly.

Again, slow down and gently wait for an image, word, or feeling to come into awareness that perfectly expresses what is at the core of your present experience.

Place this in a package and hand it to Jesus.

End your time of prayer with an Our Father, entrusting to God all that will happen during this upcoming week.

Prayer

O Lord, Jesus Master:
Let your desires be our desires.
Let your thoughts be our thoughts.
Let your actions be our actions.
Let your pain be our pain.
Let your attitudes be our attitudes.
Let your words be our words.
Let your joy be our joy.
Let your prayer be our prayer.
Let us be completely fused to you,
so that it is no longer we who live
but you, O Christ, who live in us and love through us. Amen.
