



Altar Flower Memorials -- Each weekend you have the opportunity to donate the weekend arrangement on the altar in memory of loved ones. The flower arrangement will be the one piece placed in front of the main altar. The name of your loved one will be placed in the bulletin for that weekend. The parish makes arrangements for the flowers. (suggested donation is \$75)

My Dear Friends in Christ,

I have a lawyer-friend of mine who is fond of saying that "where there's a will, there's a way... and greedy relatives!" While this is humorous, it speaks to the



readings we have before us today. The danger of wealth is that it can come to possess us and become the "driving force" in all that we do in life. To have the "best of everything" might get us far in this world, but it won't "get us through the (Pearly) Gates", as my mother would say. The treasures we store up for ourselves in this life perhaps will give us comfort and security for a time, but that time eventually runs out. It is at that time that we have to make an accounting of how we spent our time, talent and, yes, treasure.

This final accounting, given to Almighty God, is one that won't take into account how much wealth we amassed, how many zeros are in our bank account or how "secure" we made ourselves in this life. We might well be asked questions like "how did you spend your time with your family?", "how did you reach out your hand to a brother or sister in need?" or "what 'heavenly treasures' (such as love, justice and peace) did you store up for yourself?" These questions are indicative of how we should be spending our time here on earth. Many have the mistaken notion that "this is all there is", or that "God won't care how I spent my time, as long as I was a good person". These misguided thoughts are fostered as a result of "buying into" a culture that offers platitudes such as "Follow the Golden Rule – the one who has the gold makes the rules!" or "The one with the most 'toys' at the end wins". How sad it must be to live one's life like this.

The beauty of the Christian life is that it offers so much more than the world can give. The strength of the Christian life is that the "treasures in heaven" which we store up for ourselves are the "bricks" that pave the way to the "road" to the Kingdom. This not to say that we can "earn" our way into heaven, for the gift of Eternal Life is just that – a gift. It is one freely given by God, paid for by Jesus through His death on the Cross. It is not something we merit on our own, but it is something in which we can participate. This participation comes when we offer ourselves as "gift" to the world, using our God-given talents and abilities to their fullest.

May we heed the words of Scripture given to us today by realizing that all that this world has to offer isn't all there is. May we believe that we are destined for great things and that we can participate in them with the help of the Holy Spirit. May we come to the Kingdom and be welcomed in with those beautiful words, "Well done, my good and faithful servant; come, share your master's joy." (Mt 25:21).

THE DEACON'S COLUMN

This Is No Ordinary Line: Communion

In the fourth grade I began serving the Mass as an altar server. During those formative years, I grew to love the Mass and the many meaningful rituals that are part of its celebration. When I was a senior in high school, the pastor of St. Ann's Parish, Fr. John L. Mansfield, asked me if I would consider becoming an Extraordinary Minister of the Eucharist. With this new ministry, I began to learn a new lesson as I placed the blessed sacrament into the hands and onto the tongues of the people standing in line—that no matter one's age, gender, looks, or occupation, we are all part of one body—receiving the same Lord.

To receive communion worthily and well, we need to be sure we are in a state of grace. The penitential rite at the beginning of Mass prepares us by forgiving venial sins. If we are in a state of mortal sin, then we can prepare for Mass and communion by receiving the sacrament of reconciliation where we confess our sins, express contrition, do penance, and receive absolution. In addition to preparing our soul to receive communion, the Church still requires us to fast for one hour before reception of Holy Communion (not one hour before Mass). This fast helps us prepare a place in our heart and soul for the Lord. As we abstain from food and drink for the hour leading up to communion, we become aware of our need and desire for food and drink. By denying ourselves bodily food and drink, we are invited to see in our physical hunger a spiritual hunger for Jesus Christ who is true food and true drink.

In addition to being prepared to receive communion, we are to approach the minster of communion reverently. The communion line is not like the line we stand in at the local coffee shop or grocery store. We approach communion as pilgrims moving toward Jesus. The Church instructs the faithful to make an act of reverence before receiving communion. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (3rd Edition) states that, "when receiving Holy Communion, the communicant bows his or her head before the Sacrament as a gesture of reverence" (#160). The minister of communion raises the host slightly and says, "The Body of Christ" to which the communicant says, "Amen."

This "Amen" is particularly important because it is an act of faith. The Church teaches that Jesus' true body, blood, soul, and divinity is present in the Eucharist. It is a sad truth that many Catholics are not aware of, or do not believe, this awesome reality. Yet, it is true, in every Eucharist, Jesus is "truly, really, and contained in Holy Communion (Council of Trent, *Canones de ss. Eucharistiae sacramento*, can. 1)." When we say "Amen" we are saying, "Truly, I believe." Not only do we say "Yes" to True Presence of Christ in the Sacrament, but we are also saying "Yes" to the faith community that gathers to celebrate the Eucharist. In this way, communion is not only a communion with Jesus, but it builds communion among the individual members of the faith community.

Finally, receiving communion is a foretaste of heaven. What we do on earth at the Mass, the saints do in heaven. The saints in heaven are not simply spectators. Each saint is in a deep communion with Jesus and through him with the other two persons of the Trinity and all the other saints in heaven and earth. At our baptism, we became another Christ in the world. By our reception of Holy Communion, we invite Jesus' into the depths of our being so that his life can be our life and where he is we can be—on earth and eternally in heaven.

MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



Think you're a serious minimalist because you got rid of your television and cleaned some boxes out of the basement? Downsized to a tiny house and now own just three shirts and one pair of shoes? We'll, you still have way more than St. Francis of Assisi did. This is a guy who famously took off the very clothes he was wearing in front of a bewildered crowd

because he refused to be beholden to his father for material possessions. He then became a wandering beggar because even a tiny house would have been too luxurious. It wasn't about minimalism for Francis, though, and his goal wasn't simply to live with less stuff. A person could easily get rid of everything, de-clutter, become an icon of minimalism — and still have an empty heart. It isn't as if emptying out the closet is a magic pill for all that ails you and if you simply toss it all you'll be as happy as Francis. There was actually a method to his madness, and his minimalism was just a by-product of a larger vision he had of human fulfillment.

"Stuff" isn't bad simply because it's stuff; stuff is bad when we have too much of it and it overwhelms us. But even if I'm drowning in an overstuffed wardrobe of clothes that I don't need, it doesn't mean the solution is to throw it all away. Someone else could greatly benefit if I were to share it. Francis didn't live a minimalist lifestyle for his own selfish purposes; he lived that way so that he could be more generous to others. He was unencumbered as he traveled to spend time with and encourage charity for the poor. He got rid of all material restrictions on himself so that he could give his life away in love to others. So, when the cleaning bug strikes, we too can consider how to be generous not only with the things we want gone but maybe to give just a little more than we're comfortable with, because generosity builds up treasure in the heart and wins a far more important possession – the love and gratitude of others.

Francis famously preached a sermon to a group of songbirds because he wanted to emphasize how, even if we fail to realize it, nature is heaven-shaped. The beauty of nature reveals a deeper, even more beautiful world beyond this one. Man-made things aren't always able to convey the same message; some objects might be beautiful and lovely but other products are disposable and utilitarian.

Francis may have given away all his possessions, but he never gave away his appreciation for natural beauty. To be a minimalist doesn't mean we have to only inhabit plain, ugly surroundings. In his "Canticle of the Creatures" Francis enthuses: "Brother Sun, who brings the day ... is beautiful and radiant in all his splendor!" The more we're able to share this attitude and see the beauty all around us, whether that be simply noticing the sunrise, taking a walk in the park, or playing catch with your dog in the backyard, the less stuff we'll need in our lives. It takes courage to let go, to loosen your grip on the material possessions that provide comfort. It takes courage not to worry about people making fun of you for being different, or to stand up to the social snobbery of having a house that isn't all that large, or only having one car instead of two. Francis shrugged off his fears, left everything behind and never worried what anybody said about him. If there's one thing that minimalism can teach us, it's that life is what we make of it and if we're brave enough to cut ourselves free from anything that holds us back, the reward is well worth the effort.

Our aim is to keep bikes from being thrown out when they can be reused. (We can pick up bicycles if you cannot get them there)















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
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
