

A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

My Dear Friends in Christ,

"Back in the day", as they say, one of my favorite bands was the Grateful Dead (yes, I am a "Deadhead", the collective name ascribed to devotees of this band). One of their most popular (and one of my



favorite) songs of theirs is "I Need A Miracle (Every Day)"; in this tune, the singer speaks of the fact that he needs a miracle (in this case, a relationship) every day.

In today's gospel, Jesus performs the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. There are some modern-day theologians who will say that Jesus didn't *really* perform a miracle, but that the people were so moved by Jesus that they shared what they had with others and thus, all were fed. I tend to go the "traditional" route and believe that Jesus actually took the five loaves and two fish (the amounts vary between the gospels) and blessed them, multiplying them in such number that all walked away satisfied. Did Jesus really multiply a handful of bread and fish? I believe so, but that's not the point of the story, really. The key of this biblical event is that Jesus has such power, he has the ability to take a little and multiply it into a lot; if we trust in Jesus, He has the ability to take our little faith and multiply it to do great things.

We live in a culture skeptical of miracles. We live in a society that wants answers to all things, and they want them **now**. They're not a group to believe in miracles because it takes the control out of their hands and puts it in the hands of an entity that they can't control – God. I, personally, like the fact that I don't always have to be in control, in charge, have all the answers. I like the fact that we have a God who can take a few loaves of bread and a couple of fish and feed a multitude. It shows to me that God cares for all of our needs: emotional, spiritual and physical.

Miracles happen in our lives every day. This is how saints come about in our faith tradition. For one to be declared "blessed" two miracles have to be attributed to them; for "sanctification" to occur, three miracles have to be attributed to them (this is sometimes "waived", as it was in the case of Saint John Paul II). The challenge in this is that all physical, scientific and temporal explanations have to be exhausted. For a miracle to occur, no earthly reason can exist. This is the "driving force" behind the miracles of Jesus – no earthly power can explain them, because they are not rooted in this reality...and neither are we.

My friends, we are God's greatest miracle. Let us have the courage to live this way. Let us come to realize that we are walking miracles, and that the best way that we can live up to this reality is by giving God glory in our words, deeds and lives.

Journey to Peace: Mary Magdalene

Holiness

The tomb is empty. It wasn't what Mary Magdalene had expected to find; nor were the angels sitting inside. What a moment of panic she must have experienced! We often panic when an unexpected situation is thrust upon us. And just as her panic blinded her to recognizing Jesus, so can ours blind us to recognizing him in our lives as well.

Once we see Jesus, really see him, as the Risen Lord and the Son of God, we are transformed and it is that transformation which leads to holiness.

We need to open our eyes to see the holiness of everything around us, for everything is touched by God's hand.

Take a few moments to become aware of God's presence. Close your eyes and take a few deep breaths, remembering that in this very moment you are under the gaze of God, who knows and loves you totally.

Bring to mind something that is causing you to panic. It could be something that you're worried or unsure about. It could be a problem, a task, or responsibility. It could be anything.

A reading from the Word of God:

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her." (John 20:11-18, NRSV).

Ask yourself: How is Mary Magdalene finding holiness in this passage? How can you?

Notice what arises within you. It could be a feeling, an image, a word, a memory, anything.

Slow down and wait for this feeling, image, or word to become clearer for you. Become fully aware of it and sit with it for a few moments.

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Then, in the sanctuary of your baptized soul (which is the temple of the Holy Spirit) **speak to that Divine Spirit**, saying: *O Holy Spirit, beloved of my soul, I adore you. Enlighten me, guide me, strengthen me, console me. Tell me what I should do; give me Your orders. I promise to submit myself to all that you desire of me and to accept all that you permit to happen to me. Let me only know your will.* (Cardinal Mercier's Prayer to the Holy Spirit)

After a few moments of stillness, return to the situation that panicked you and see how it may have shifted, even subtly.

Again, slow down and wait for an image, word, or feeling to come into awareness that perfectly expresses what is at the core of your present experience.

Place your feelings and thoughts in a package... and hand it to Jesus.

Prayer

Jesus, Divine Master, I adore you as the only-begotten Son of God, come on the earth to give Life, the most abundant life to humanity. I thank you because by dying on the cross, you merited life for me, which you give me in baptism and nourish in the Eucharist and in the other Sacraments. Live in me, O Jesus, with the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, so that I may love you with my whole mind, strength and heart, and love my neighbor as myself for love of you. Increase charity in me, so that one day, called to the glorious life, I may be united with you in the eternal happiness in heaven. Amen. (Prayer of Blessed James Alberione)

End your time of prayer with an Our Father, entrusting all your needs and feelings to God.

Mary Magdalene would have wanted to have her Lord as he was before, considering the Cross a tragic memory to be forgotten. Henceforth, however, there was no longer room for a merely human relationship with the Risen One. To meet him, we must not turn back but relate to him in a new way. We must move ahead! St Bernard underlines this: Jesus "invites us all to this new life, to this passing.... We will not see Christ with a backward glance" (Homily on Easter).

This is what happened with Thomas. Jesus showed him his wounds, not to make him forget the Cross but to make it unforgettable in the future, too.

It is towards the future, in fact, that we now turn our gaze. The disciple's task is to witness to the death and Resurrection of his Master and to his new life. For this reason Jesus invited his unbelieving friend to "touch him": he wanted him to witness directly to his Resurrection.

Dear brothers and sisters, we too, like Mary Magdalene, Thomas and the other Apostles, are called to be witnesses of Christ's death and Resurrection. We cannot keep this important news to ourselves. We must convey it to the whole world: "We have seen the Lord!" (Jn 20: 25).

As people begin to come back to Mass and those of us who have been attending become more relaxed after having attended Mass for a few weeks, it is important that we continue to follow the guidelines set up to ensure our safety.

REQUIREMENTS FOR ATTENDING MASS

* In order to limit social gathering and allow time to seat registered parishioners, those attending Mass should arrive no earlier than 30 minutes and no later than 15 minutes before the start of Mass. (Seats will then be offered to those parishioners on 'standby' who arrived without pre-registration.)

* One entrance: Entry into church will be front right and left side doors (no entry through middle doors) at St. John's, front door at St. Ann's. PLEASE NOTE THAT IN SEATING PEOPLE (ASIDE FROM THOSE WITH PHYSICAL CHALLENGES), DUE TO SAFETY PROTOCOLS IN PLACE, WE CANNOT GUARANTEE YOU A PARTICULAR SEAT IN THE CHURCH.

* All parishioners must wear masks. There are several exceptions, such as: children under the age of two, and people with underlying health conditions. The wearing of masks for children between the ages of 2-5 is based on the parents' discretion.

* Parishioners should bring their own hand sanitizer if possible. The church will have limited supply.

* Parishioners must maintain 6 feet of social distance between each other at all times. This does not apply to families that live in the same household.

- * Appropriate social distancing spaces will be designated on the floor/in the aisles. Ushers will provide guidance.
- * Everyone will enter church using front doors and leave church using side doors. Those closest to the front doors will leave first

* There will be no sign of peace, offertory collection or singing during Mass. Baskets for financial contributions will be available as you leave church.

* Special instructions on receiving Holy Communion will be presented during each Mass. (Please be patient; wait for instructions by the ushers — everyone will be served.)

* To prevent close contact, the clergy will employ minimal entrancing in or recessing out of the church. (Please wait for the Ushers to exit after the Priest and Deacon have exited.)

* Public gatherings before or after Mass are not permitted outside church.

AN IMPORTANT NOTE:

If you are uneasy about attending such an event, please remember that the Dispensation from Reception of Communion is still in effect. If you are in the "vulnerable/at risk" category, please remember that you need not (nor would I want you to) risk your health and well-being. It is for this reason that I will still be taping Sunday Mass (broadcast on EB-CAM and posted on Facebook/parish websites) and live-streaming Daily Mass on Facebook.
