My Dear Friends in Christ,

As I was reflecting on today’s gospel, I couldn’t help but think of “A Christmas Carol”, by Charles Dickens. Truly, I was, and I’ll be happy to explain why (even though Christmas is months away). In “A Christmas Carol”, Scrooge is visited by the Three Ghosts (Christmas Past, Christmas Present, and Christmas Future); in today’s gospel, the “rich man” featured in the parable presented by Jesus begs Abraham to call forth someone who has risen from the dead to visit his brothers so that their fate does not “mirror” his. This is where the stories “part company”, for a bit. Abraham realizes that their minds won’t be changed even if someone who has risen from the dead visits them. This is primarily because they (the brothers) have Moses and the prophets to “steer them in the right direction” - they shouldn’t need someone to rise from the dead to “get it”. We know, from the benefit of two thousand years of salvation history, that God did send someone risen from the dead (Jesus, in His post-resurrection encounters with the disciples) to help His followers “get it”. Did they need this? Some did, some didn’t. God realized, however, that something “big” had to happen for people to be convinced of Jesus’ claim that He was the Son of God.

What did/does/will (depending on where we are on our journey of faith) it take for us to “get it”? Was reading the Old Testament, specifically the books of the prophets, enough for us? Was reading the New Testament, specifically the Gospels, enough for us? Were the resurrection (and post-resurrection) accounts enough for us? Are we still not convinced that God has a plan for us? Each one of us must answer these questions for ourselves, for our faith journeys are just that – ours; no one else can live them for us. We can (and should) be taught dogmas and doctrines, which provide an important “base” from which our beliefs take root and blossom into action. Eventually, however, if our faith is to be a true and lasting faith which bears fruit, we must come to believe on our own, putting our faith into action.

Lazarus was given a share in the Kingdom because God has a special place in His heart (the Church would call it a “preferential option”) for the poor. We must have a similar place in our heart for the poor, including not only the physically poor, but the spiritually impoverished (who may actually be more prevalent in our community). The “rich man” would have had a similar place in God’s Kingdom if he realized how gifted he was, and took the time to share those gifts. God has gifted us similarly. We would do well to take the time – before it is too late – to assess our own “giftedness”, and share these gifts of “time, talent and treasure” with our immediate and biological family, our friends, our family in faith here in the Together In Christ Collaborative, our local communities, our nation and our world.

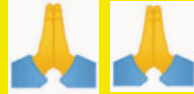
## NEWS FROM THE PARISHES

## THE DEACON'S COLUMN

### Miracle of Miracles

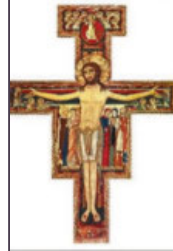
In the New Testament we read about many miracles performed by Jesus that demonstrates the power of God's Kingdom over sin and death. Jesus cures the sick by making the deaf hear and the mute speak. He cures lepers and makes those who are paralyzed walk. To feed thousands, Jesus multiplies five loaves of bread and two fish so that all can eat and be satisfied. Jesus demonstrates his divinity by calming the storm and walks on water. He shows his power of evil by expelling demons. He shows his sovereignty over death by restoring Tabitha, Jarius' daughter, and Lazarus to life. By rising from the dead, Jesus restores all of us to eternal life. Many people wonder where the miracles are today. God continues to work miracles for "those who have eyes to see and ears to hear." In our own backyard there are two noteworthy miracles that contributed to the canonizations of two beloved saints. In 1987 a two-year-old Brockton girl accidentally ingested a large amount of Tylenol leading to multiple organ failure. Her parents named her after the Carmelite Nun, Sister Teresa Benedicta (commonly known as Edith Stein). Edith Stein was a Jewish scholar who converted to Catholicism and was killed by the Nazi's at Auschwitz. After learning that their little girl ingested sixteen lethal doses of Tylenol, the family began asking people to ask the Carmelite Nun's intercession for healing. Within a few days thousands of people were asking for a miracle through the intercession of Edith Stein (Teresa Benedicta). These same people gave thanks to God when the little girl walked out of the hospital with a red balloon.

In the year 2000, Deacon Jack Sullivan of Pembroke was stricken with a debilitating spinal condition that caused extreme pain his back and legs. Jack was devoted to the life and ministry of John Cardinal Newman and after hearing an invitation to ask for "divine favors" from the late Cardinal, Jack prayed to the Lord through Cardinal Newman's intercession that he would be able to walk and continue his diaconate formation. The next morning, he was without pain, his surgery was cancelled, and he continued his classes. He did not pray for a full healing for fear of being presumptuous. In 2001 he suffered some complications that needed surgery that would require a lengthy recovery. So, Jack made a similar petition to the Lord through Cardinal Newman's intercession. Almost immediately Jack felt a warm sensation run through his body and when he woke up, he was free of pain and with an overwhelming sense of peace and joy. He was able to return to his classes as scheduled and was eventually ordained a deacon in the Archdiocese of Boston. This miracle was verified by Pope Benedict XVI and led to the Cardinal's beatification.

Though most of us do not receive miracles like the two described above, we do get to participate in and receive the "Miracle of Miracles." Every Sunday (or Saturday Vigil) we offer bread and wine that becomes for us the Body, Soul, Humanity, and Divinity, of Jesus Christ. The bread and wine become for us the Real Presence of the Living God. In Luke's Gospel, the angel says that Mary is to name Jesus, "Emmanuel" because it means "God is With Us." Every time we celebrate the Eucharist, God is with us and through our communion we are invited to be with him. It is interesting that the Church is filled on Ash Wednesday when the Church gives out ashes. People still come to the Church for the blessing of throats, and people flock to Church on Palm Sunday to get their palms. Yet, on the day the Church consecrates and distributes the greatest miracle of miracles, God himself, our Churches are not full.

Friends, as I conclude these reflections on the Eucharist, may your hearts grow with a holy desire to share and receive the Holy Eucharist. May we come become like the one we receive.

## MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY



On Oct. 4, Roman Catholics celebrate the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the Italian deacon who brought renewal to the Church through his decision to follow Jesus' words as literally as possible. In a January 2010 general audience, Pope Benedict XVI recalled this "giant of holiness" as a "great saint and a joyful man," who taught the Church that "the secret of true happiness" is "to become saints, close to God." The future Saint Francis was born on an uncertain date in the early 1180s, one of the several children born to the wealthy merchant Pietro Bernardone and his wife Pica. He originally received the name Giovanni (or John), but became known as Francesco (or Francis) by his father's choice.

Unlike many medieval saints, St. Francis was neither studious nor pious in his youth. His father's wealth gave him access to a lively social life among the upper classes, where he was known for his flashy clothes and his readiness to burst into song. Later a patron of peacemakers, he aspired to great military feats in his youth and fought in a war with a rival Italian city-state. A period of imprisonment during that conflict turned his mind toward more serious thoughts, as did a recurring dream that suggested his true "army" was not of this world. He returned to Assisi due to illness in 1205, and there began to consider a life of voluntary poverty.

Three major incidents confirmed Francis in this path. In Assisi, he overcame his fear of disease to kiss the hand of a leper. Afterward, he made a pilgrimage to Rome, where he deposited his money at Saint Peter's tomb and exchanged clothes with a beggar. Soon after he returned home, Francis heard Christ tell him in a vision: "Go, Francis, and repair my house, which as you see is falling into ruin." Francis began to use his father's wealth to restore churches. This led to a public quarrel in which the cloth-merchant's son removed his clothing and declared that he had no father except God. He regarded himself as the husband of "Lady Poverty," and resolved to serve Christ as "a herald of the Great King."

During the year 1208, the "herald" received the inspiration that would give rise to the Franciscan movement. At Mass one morning, he heard the Gospel reading in which Christ instructed the apostles to go forth without money, shoes, or extra clothing. This way of life soon became a papally-approved rule, which would attract huge number of followers within Francis' own lifetime. Through his imitation of Christ, Francis also shared in the Lord's sufferings. He miraculously received Christ's wounds, the stigmata, in his own flesh during September of 1224. His health collapsed over the next two years, a "living sacrifice" made during two decades of missionary preaching and penance.

St. Francis of Assisi died on Oct. 3, 1226. Pope Gregory IX, his friend and devotee, canonized him in 1228. May we follow your Son by walking in the footsteps of Francis of Assisi and by imitating his joyful love.

Fall dates are October 1, October 29, and November 19 from 9 AM to 5 PM. Locations are confidential. Limited to ten participants per retreat.

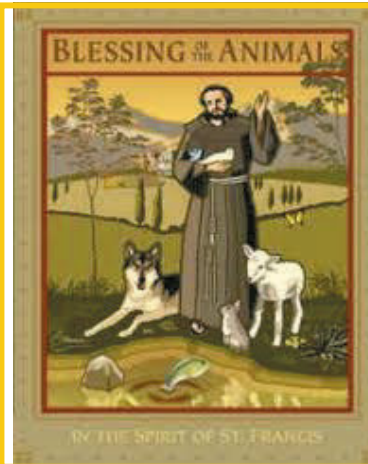

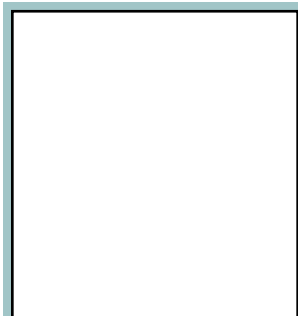
