

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Love God Love Neighbor

Growing up in my neighborhood,

there was THAT neighbor, which I suspect every neighborhood had. We had a neighbor who, perhaps because of his schedule or perhaps because of his own whims, decided that 6:00 a.m. on Saturday morning was the perfect time to run the power washer, leaf blower, snow blower, or lawn mower (depending on the season). One particular Saturday morning, it seemed like the snow blower was louder than usual. I was just about to go out and "give him a piece of my mind" when, in looking outside, I noticed that he was snow blowing OUR driveway! I went out and asked him why, and his response both took me aback and cut me to the quick: he was doing it because he heard that my father (who always took it upon himself to start the shoveling) was sick and he thought he'd be neighborly and lend a hand. It gave me a different perspective about what a "neighbor" was, as well as what type of neighbor this gentleman was.

In today's gospel, Jesus is asked which of the commandments was "first". Now, mind you, in Jewish tradition, there are 613 commandments (and to think that we have trouble with ten, sometimes!), so to put one first was a tall order. If Jesus was to do this, He would be implying that this "first" commandment was the most important one. This was a trap, and Jesus knew it. Jesus knew that the Scribes, Pharisees, and Sadducees were often trying to trap Him, and He never fell into any of these traps. In this case, Jesus avoids the trap by "synthesizing" the commandments into two: Love of God, Love of Neighbor. In regard to my story above, I often think that Love of God is far easier than Love of Neighbor, but that isn't always the case. While it can be challenging to love our neighbor, loving God takes effort as well. Often times, God will do something or allow something that leaves us perplexed, amazed, and often times angry. We can't always see into the mind and heart of God, and many times the "permissive will of God" (when God allows something to happen) that confuses, frustrates and angers us. It is in those times that the grace of "trust" is needed, trust that God knows what He is doing and that, ultimately, He is in charge. Even when we have that trust, that doesn't mean that it is easy; it is often a hard won trust, coming over a period of time - sometimes months, or even years.

May we come to trust that God, who is in charge, knows what is best. May we come to trust that God has our best interest at heart. May we come to trust that, in the end, all will be well. May we look to God for all things, especially His mercy, His grace, and His love.














#### **MY FRANCISCAN JOURNEY**

This past Friday (November 1st), the Church celebrated All Saints Day. This is an important feast in our Church as it recognizes those men and women who, while ordinary human beings, lived extraordinary lives of faith by giving everything they had – mind, spirit, (and sometimes even) body - to God. Within the Franciscan Community, there are those men and women who have achieved, through God's grace, the title of "Saint".

When we think of saints within the Franciscan family, we of course think of Saints Francis and Clare. Without their vision, fortitude, and trust, there wouldn't be a Franciscan or Claretian Order. They are the "standard bearers" and "benchmarks" by which all other "saintly" members of their respective Orders are measured. They are also the "yardstick" by which many within those Communities (who are not (yet) saints) measure their lives of faith and service to the Church and the People of God.

When we look beyond those two, we see many who stand out as Saints who hold the title of "Franciscan" or "Claretian". There is St. Bonaventure, St. Joseph of Cupertino, St. Lawrence of Brindisi, and St. Anthony of Padua. In more "modern" times, there is St. Marianne Cope, Pope St. John XXIII, and St. Padre Pio. All of them serve as examples to us of what it is we can be when we focus our energies on God's plan for us. They can be a "beacon" for us when we find ourselves mired in the "darkness" of sin and suffering.

As we celebrate All Saints Day, may we come to see all of our Franciscan friends in Heaven as models of faith for us, to guide us to the Kingdom. May we ask that through their intercession, we may be drawn closer into a love of God and work with them to build up the Kingdom of God here on earth so that we may spend eternity in the Kingdom of God in Heaven! #### All Our Strength

I didn't realize how much my arms would hurt when I became a mom.

It occurred to me first during Mass when my daughter was just a few weeks old. She was the kind of kid who could only sleep in someone's arms. I desperately wanted her to stay quiet during the service, so I held the swaddled bundle in front of me like it was a bomb, not daring to move. By the homily, my arms were on fire.

I quickly realized this was a common scenario of my new life as a parent. Holding, rocking, bouncing, restraining, dragging — honestly, my weak little chicken-arms had never been worked out like this before. It took all my strength.

But isn't that the way it is with everything that's worthwhile? It takes all your strength. Not some of it. Not most of it. All of it.

I am a fairly active Catholic. My faith impacts a lot of areas of my life. But there are still boundaries that I've drawn around God. There are places I haven't let Him in. Things I keep "for myself." Experiences that are just so full of *me*, so full of my own plans and my own desires.


