Dear Friends.

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It is hard to believe that this is the fourth and final Sunday of Advent. It has been a wonderful and different Advent for me and for many others. And as Advent brings us Christmas, this Christmas will be both wonderful and different for me and for many others. We have had 35 funerals in 2011 or about a dozen more than any of the previous 10 years. Many families, including my own, have lost loved ones and will realize that the wood of the manger comes from the wood of the cross. Three families lost a little baby this year and I will baptize the twin brother of one of these "little angels" in January. Two wonderful parents lost their 25 year old daughter and many others lost a spouse of 40 years or more. Lots of people in East Bridgewater will find it difficult to have a "Merry Little Christmas" this year. And they will be sitting in a pew in this church on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day; perhaps they will be sitting next to you. Maybe they will just slip into one of the many festive liturgies in hope of finding a little Christmas Spirit and Christmas Peace. You may not even know who they are but be one with

them - be one with everyone, be one with them and with all who will have the courage to bring their broken hearts to the baby Jesus. Sometimes, with all of the Christmas gifts, decorations, cards, parties, and all of the wonderful happenings that are an important part of the Christmas celebration, we can tend to forget the real reason for Christmas, the reason for the birth of Christ. Jesus became one of us so that we could become like Him. Jesus became one of us so that we might live with Him in Heaven. Advent, Lent, Christmas and Easter are part of the cycle of life and are part of the cycle of "New Life." I would like to end this reflection with something that was written by Lawrence Ferlingghetti. It touched my heart and hopefully it will touch yours.

Christ climbed down from his bare Tree this year and ran away to where there were no rootless Christmas trees hung with candy canes and breakable stars. Christ climbed down from his bare Tree this year and ran away to where there were no gilded Christmas trees and no tinsel Christmas trees and no pink plastic Christmas trees and no gold Christmas trees and no black Christmas trees and no powder blue Christmas trees hung with electric trains and clever cornball relatives. ...

Christ climbed down from his bare Tree this year and ran away to where no Bing Crosby carolers groaned of a White Christmas and where no Radio City angels ice skated wingless thru a winter wonderland into a Jingle bell heaven daily at 8:30 with Midnight Mass matinees.

Christ climbed down from his bare Tree this year and softly stole away into some anonymous soul. He waits again an unimaginable and impossible immaculate Re-conception –the very craziest of Second Comings.

May each of us make the presence of the Baby Jesus known and felt this Christmas Season. Then, this will truly be a time of Joy to the World!
