

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today we celebrate two important days on this same day, one a holiday and one a holy day. The holiday, of course, is Father's Day and the holy day is the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity (Trinity Sunday). The former reflects the love that we have for our fathers, both living and dead; the latter reflects the love we have for God in the "three-in-one" reality of Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Father's Day is an important day of reflection in many ways. Fathers in our culture have undergone many transitions throughout the years. Many years ago, they were seen as "provider", as "breadwinner", it was they who gave sustenance to their family by what they brought into the household to provide nourishment and comfort for their families. In our society, this role has changed over the years, especially with the advent of two-income families and "stay-at-home dads". In the Catholic-Christian tradition, the father still plays an important role in the "procreation and education of offspring" (one of the purposes of marriage, along with it being a reflection of the love of the couple), which is seen as one of the opportunities which traditional marriage (that is "one man, one woman") affords. This model is currently being challenged by cultural and social mores which often times are "at odds" with this view. The Church still maintains this view, for it is in this traditional structure of husband and wife" (again, that being one man, one woman) as the way which God intended marriage to be. The Church sees marriage not merely a "social contract" (which it is in the "civil" view) but as a "divine covenant", one which includes God in the "equation" (which is in the "divine" realm). This is why Father's Day (and Mother's Day, for that matter) remains an important day in the "social fabric" of our culture.

In much the same way, the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity has undergone some changes. The changes to Trinity Sunday aren't so much liturgical as they are personal, and they can change even day-to-day. God meets us where we are at, and in doing so comes to us in the way in which we need to be touched and transformed. When one prays (I would hope!) one encounters the "essence" of God in the "persons" of God. One should "note the quotes", as my former English teacher would say; I use guotes to indicate that one, in using these terms, just "scratches the surface" as to who God is for us. In the Trinity, that is Father, Son and Spirit, one encounters the "creative", "redeeming" and "sanctifying" (again, the quotes) aspects of God. Throughout our lives, the ways in which we come to "meet" the Trinity (and the Trinity "meets" us) depends on a large part as to where we are. We 'grow where we are planted" and God nurtures us as we are, transforming us.

May this day bring about an appreciation for our fathers and Our Father. May it help us to understand who God is for us in the Trinity – Creator, Redeemer, Sanctifier...and so much more! May the Blessing of Almighty God – Father, Son and Spirit be with you now, and remain with you forever!
