My Dear Friends in Christ,

It is at this point in the journey of one going through the RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) that the candidate would undertake the first of the "scrutinies", a period of deep introspection preparing one for reception of the Sacraments of the Church. We are blessed here at St. John's to have one catechumen (being received into full Communion in the Church) and two candidates (who are completing their Sacraments), and so we read the particular gospel passage appropriate for the day. The three "themes" covered in these scrutinies are "water", "light" and "life". Today's gospel (along with the first reading) covers the first of these themes, "water".

In the first reading, Moses is leading the Israelites from bondage in Egypt to freedom in the Promised Land. They have had it rough – they are running low, or are out of, food and water. They are grumbling against Moses and rebelling against his leadership. They are fed up! In complaining to Moses, their wish is to go back to Egypt, for they feel that it's better to live in bondage than to die in freedom. Moses then moves up the "chain of command" and brings the people's plea to God. God then commands Moses to draw water from the rock, striking it with the staff with which he previously parted the Red Sea. The people are then nourished with water from the rock, showing them that God is, indeed, in their midst (as they had doubted God's presence).

In today's gospel, we see again that theme of "water" at work. In this account of Jesus and the "woman at the well" (as she has been come to be known throughout salvation history), there are two different "types" of water at work here: there is actual, physical water, being drawn from a well, and there is spiritual water, found in the person of Jesus. It seems that there are many "surprises" throughout this passage, as well. Jesus' encounter with the woman at the well is unusual enough – a man speaking with a woman in public (unheard of at the time), a Samaritan and a Jew having anything to do with one another (unheard of, as well). Then you have the insights of Jesus which surprise the woman to the point of "provoking" her to engage in discipleship, by calling others to come and see this stranger who seems to know so much about her. She takes her personal encounter with Christ and brings others to the knowledge of the truth which she has encountered.

Throughout our Lenten journey, we are called to encounter Jesus in many ways, especially in the three-fold tenets of Lent: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. May we direct our prayer to seeking to know Jesus better. May we fast so as to join in the sacrifice of Christ. May we engage ourselves in almsgiving, using our time, talent and treasure to build up our community of faith. May our Lenten journey be "successful" in drawing us ever closer into the mystery that is God.
