



My Dear Friends in Christ,



One definition of an "enigma" is "one that is puzzling, ambiguous or inexplicable". I mention this in light of today's celebration of Father's Day, with my own father having "gone home to God" and the fact that he was a bit of an

"enigma". He was not educated beyond high school (having left school in 11th grade for the war), but he was bright and knew many things. He was not athletic (although in his younger days, he played Park League Football (a highly athletic group of men)), but he was always out with us, teaching us how to throw/catch/run. He was quick-witted and could "cut you down to size" easily, but was very gentle and forgiving when he needed to be. We often wondered "who IS this man?", but never quite had him figured out completely.

Jesus was, for many, an enigma. As testified by the apostles, Jesus was seen as many things: a healer, a prophet and a holy man. The apostles (Peter, specifically) see Him for what/who He is: "the Christ of God" (Lk 9:20); in other words, the Messiah. Yes, they see Jesus as prophetic, with a healing touch, but they see much more than that. This is largely due to the proximity in which they see Jesus. They are with him day in and day out, so they see all "sides" of Him. He must have, however, remained a mystery (an "enigma") to many of the people, the disciples included.

Who is Jesus for us? I dare say that each one of us may have a different answer to that question, depending on many things. Depending on our life experience, our current state of mind/way of life, and where we are on our journey of faith. At different times, Jesus is seen by us in different ways. This isn't a bad thing; in fact, it can be a wonderful thing. It reminds us that Jesus is, indeed, all things for all people. Jesus comes to us in our need, where we are, to be with us in the way we need Him to be there. For our part, we need to be open to receiving Jesus as He *is* and not how we *want* Him to be. This can be a challenge, because we may feel we know, inherently, what it is we need. Jesus, however, knows us better than we know ourselves. This is why we need to be open – it is the only way that we can grow in knowledge of and relationship with, Jesus.

When we listen to today's readings, we see what Jesus did for us. When Zechariah prophesies about Jesus, he speaks of Him as being mourned and grieved for like "an only son...a firstborn" (Zec 12:10); this alludes to Jesus' death, a death accepted for us. St. Paul reminds us that we were "baptized into Christ" (Gal 3:27); this reminds us of the relationship we have with Jesus, as brothers and sisters. Finally, our gospel reminds us of Jesus' place in our lives as Messiah and Savior. All of these images, put together, give us a pretty full picture of Jesus. We will not fully understand who Jesus is for us, and what He did for us, until we reach the Kingdom. Until then, let us continue to discover who Jesus is for us, being open to the wonderful possibilities which this mystery holds!
