

DEACONS' CORNER

Let me continue my remarks about the Mass. We come to the Liturgy of the Eucharist which begins with the Presentation of the Gifts. The early Christians each brought some bread and wine to be used for the Mass and to be given to the clergy and the poor. Once the priest has received the gifts of bread and wine and stands at the altar, he praises God Who has provided them. To the prayer over the bread and then the wine, we respond "Blessed be God forever".

After the priest washes his hands, he invites us to pray that his sacrifice and ours may be acceptable to God, the Almighty Father. Standing we pray "May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of His name, for our good and the good of all His holy church". In the first letter of Saint Peter we are reminded that we are meant to be a holy priesthood, (each baptized member of the assembly is offering a spiritual sacrifice, in keeping with his or her priestly role). We each participate in the one Sacrifice of Jesus Christ. Not to be misinformed, the Mass is a single sacrifice offered by all present.

In the next issue of my corner, I will write about the Eucharistic prayer which is the <u>center</u> of the entire Mass. It is a prayer of thanksgiving and sanctification. I will need more space, so I will conclude right here for now.

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Today our Savior invites us, in today's gospel, "come to Me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest" (Mt 11:28). This past weekend was, for most, a time of rest from our labors. We, as a nation commemorate this Fourth of July Weekend with parades, cookouts and, of course, the requisite fireworks demonstrations. Among all of this pageantry, let us never forget the sacrifice that has gotten us this freedom to do all of this celebrating. We "stand on the shoulders of giants", of all of those brave men and women who have fought, and continue to fight, for our freedoms and liberties which we enjoy. It is imperative that we never forget this sacrifice, lest we sully their memory.

We recognize, as well, that as we rest from our labors, the work of Christian discipleship knows no holiday. We are always Christians, whether at work, at school, at home or on a holiday/seasonal break. Our holiday this past weekend gave us the appropriate time to reflect on what true freedom is all about for the Christian disciple. It is not liberty to do as we please, but to do as we ought in the name of God and, in doing so, honor God with the gift of that service. We come to realize, as we celebrate the gifts of "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness", that these gifts come from the "giver of all good gifts" – Almighty God.

Life, the first and greatest gifts, is to be afforded to all — the preborn, the mentally and physically challenged, the poor and marginalized, the imprisoned, the elderly and infirmed, and even those actively dying. It is given by God and, as such, is neither ours to bestow or remove. Liberty, the second gift, is that opportunity God gives us to worship Him free of constraints from the world. We are pleased and privileged to have it, and must cherish it always. The Pursuit of Happiness is not the attainment of material goods, but the "storing up in heaven" the gifts that last — peace, justice, truth and love — gifts that have permanence and meaning.

I pray that we used this weekend (as well as subsequent holiday weekends) wisely and well, reflecting on the goodness of God and all of the gifts He has given us. May we pray that God will continue to pour out His Spirit upon us, so that we may seek out these gifts, use them for the betterment of ourselves and our brothers and sisters and always strive for the greater glory of God!

The liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green. Green is meant to symbolize hope, to be a symbol of life. Several things are possible to take advantage of this seasonal color. We can imagine taking a green plant that we already have, or getting one, and placing it, or a cutting from it, in a prominent place in our house to say that we are going to be hopeful in God's love for us. God's love, like the life flowing through this plant, is faithful. When we look at the plant, we can be conscious of an inner desire - perhaps expressed in a verbal prayer - that God give us hope and trust. And, when we water the plant, or perhaps give it plant food, we are nourishing this life, as God nourishes us. A simple symbol, but it can be a very ordinary time gift for us.

Other basic symbols can be drawn from where we are and what is common and ordinary in our region. I might, for example, be near the sea or a lake. I could gather some beautiful shells and put them in a simple bowl as a sign of the life around me. I might be in a more arid or even desert area and a number of stones or a small amount of sand could be placed in a bowl to be a sign for me of the earth and God's care for us in this area. I might be in a rural area, and have the opportunity to bring some flowers from a garden or simple wild flowers from a nearby field.


Whatever we gather and intentionally let be a symbol by assigning

it some meaning, we open a door for God's grace to bless us. In general, the themes we might consider to find symbols for are about the journey we are on. We are counting time, week by week, listening to God's word and growing in our relationship with God. This is not a season of "nothing going



on." It is a time which we can symbolize growth, movement, process, life.

During Ordinary Time, we can do something as simple as taking something we always do each day and doing it in a symbolic way. For example, we might be in the practice of putting our keys on a table when we come in the house. We might be in the habit of putting our mobile phone on the table as well. During Ordinary Time, we could get a simple bowl or plate and put our keys or phone on that bowl or plate. We could perhaps find a simple green cloth to put in the bowl or on the plate. It can be the symbol of our commitment to be faithful to the journey of these days, and to place our trust in our faithful God. We can even offer a simple prayer, like, "Lord, these keys represent (this phone is a symbol of) so much of the commitments I have made and the places you have called me to be and where you have called me to serve. Let my placing them in the bowl all during this season give me a sense of taking up this mission you have given me, with hope in you."

Emily Pugh, SCN, 91, was born in Bardstown, Kentucky. She died at Nazareth Home in Louisville, Kentucky, on Wednesday, June 28, 2017. Sister Emily had been a professed Sister of Charity of Nazareth for 72 years.

From 1945-1963, Sister Emily served as a teacher in elementary education in Memphis, Tennessee; Paducah, Kentucky; Bridgeport, Ohio; Bellevue, Kentucky; and Hyde Park, Massachusetts. From 1963-1972 she served as a teacher of English, French, and history in secondary education at schools in Brockton, Massachusetts; Birmingham, Alabama; Owensboro and Louisville, Kentucky. Sister Emily also served as the director of religious education in Brockton and Bridgewater, Massachusetts.

Sister Emily is survived by her nieces, nephews, by her religious community, and by the many persons whose lives she touched.

Visitation will be held at Nazareth Home in Louisville, Kentucky on Wednesday, July 5, 2017, from 1:30-2:30 p.m. and after 4 p.m. at St. Vincent Church, Nazareth, Kentucky.
