Many of us grew up with this old saying. The good sisters told us, our priest told us, or our catechism teacher said it. Hate to break the news to you, but it's not in the catechism or anywhere in church law. If you arrive after Mass has begun because you wished to sleep in a bit, watch the last of a show on TV, or are habitually late: it probably doesn't count. If you are late because there was a car accident and you had left in plenty of time: yes it does count. It isn't so much a when question but a why question.

Same goes with the end of Mass. If you receive communion and are out the door because you want to beat the parking lot traffic, be first at brunch, or get home to watch the beginning of the game: It really doesn't count. But if you get a text that a loved one has been rushed to the hospital, you can leave anytime and it counts. Again it's a matter of why, not when.

The gospel of Matthew states that when Jesus discovered the apostles asleep after the Last Supper, he said to them "Are you not able watch with me for one hour?" (MT 26:40) When we consider all that God gives to us, can't we spend an hour a week, from beginning to end, with Him? I would hope we can.

The good news is that if you always assumed the "in by the Gospel, out after communion," adage to be true, you committed no sin, because you did not know. But, now you know and it's a different story.

"Get Me To the Church On Time!"

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Most of you, by now, know my love of bumper stickers. I read them when I am stuck in traffic (which happens far too often than I'd like!), and they help pass



the time. Sometimes, the bumper stickers I read make it into a homily or bulletin column (as is the case today). Recently, I read a bumper sticker that read, "If God Had Wanted Us To Be Permissive, He Would Have Given Us 'The Ten 'Suggestions'". I think the point of the sticker is that the Ten Commandments (the item to which the bumper sticker was alluding) are not merely things we *should* do, but that we *must* do (i.e. we are *commanded* to do them). Jesus, in today's Gospel passage, is asked a question of the law. What is offered is a synthesis of the Commandments (of which there are 613 in the Jewish tradition), namely that you "shall love the Lord, your God with all your heart, with all your being, with all your strength, and with all your mind, and your neighbor as yourself" (Lk 10:27). This is a correct answer, but it wasn't enough for the scholar; he felt he needed to justify himself, so he took it further. The scholar asked Jesus who his neighbor was, and this is where it gets interesting.

Jesus, always looking for the hearer/reader of Scripture to grow in faith, takes the letter of the law and moves it beyond, to the spirit of the law. It is in the spirit of the law that one can live out the faith proscribed. In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus shows us what it means to be "neighbor", to go beyond what is expected, and to move into what is desired, by God. God desires us to extend ourselves beyond that which is comfortable. In the parable of the Good Samaritan, the man beaten is approached, first by a priest and then by a Levite. The priest avoids the man because he does not want to be rendered impure; the Levite avoids the man because he has no legal obligation to help and so he doesn't.

It is at this point that the Samaritan comes upon the scene. The Samaritan, being an "outsider" (that is, outside the Jewish Community) has no obligation to help this man... but he does so anyway. Beyond helping the man – by dressing his wounds, placing him on his own animal (thus forcing him to walk beside the injured man), and bringing him to an inn and caring for him – he takes it one step further, by letting the innkeeper know that if there is any further expense, he will take care of it on his way back. Why do all of this, if there is no obligation? Because faith isn't about obligation, it's about expectation – what God expects from us. God calls us to go beyond that which is comfortable, to reach out to those in need out of love, to see Christ in the "other" and to be Christ for them. May we have the courage to act as the Good Samaritan did. by extending ourselves beyond that which is "comfortable" and do what God wishes us to do: to put our faith into action, to "put our money where our mouth is" by putting our faith into action. May we do this without "counting the cost", for we know that the "price is paid" already – by Jesus Christ, Himself.

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- In the light of "a worrying negative prejudice" against the Catholic Church, Pope Francis ordered the publication of a document affirming the absolute secrecy of everything said in confession and calling on priests to defend it at all costs, even at the cost of their lives.

The need for the absolute secrecy of confession "comes directly from revealed divine law and has its roots in the very nature of the sacrament to the point that no exception whatsoever can be admitted in the ecclesial sphere and even less in the civil one," a new Vatican document said.

The "note of the Apostolic Penitentiary on the importance of the internal forum and the inviolability of the sacramental seal" was approved by Pope Francis June 21 and published by the Vatican July 1.

The note was signed by Cardinal Mauro Piacenza, head of the Apostolic Penitentiary, a Vatican court dealing with matters of conscience.

Some recent challenges to the secret of confession have come from states trying to react to the Catholic Church's clerical sexual abuse crisis, the note acknowledged. The document did not mention any specific proposed legislation, such as that working its way through the California legislature or proposed in Australia in response to a government inquiry into the sex abuse crisis.

The Catholic Church "always has safeguarded the sacramental seal with all its moral and juridical strength," the note said. "It is indispensable for the sanctity of the sacrament and for the freedom of conscience of the penitent."

When administering the sacrament of reconciliation, it said, a priest acts not as himself but "in the person of Christ." Not only is he not free to divulge anything about the confession to anyone, including the penitent outside the confessional, but he even is "obliged to suppress every involuntary memory of it."

A refusal to reveal what was said in a confession can never be described as complicity with or covering up evil, the note said, insisting that confession is "the one real antidote to evil" because it is the place where a person can abandon him- or herself to God and repent.
