


DEACON BRENDAN'S CORNER

If you have been reading the Deacon's corner for the last three Sundays, you know that I had reviewed the ceremony of Baptism. By way of context, I wish to provide you with the Church's policy regarding the qualifications for sponsors (godparents) who may be asked to fulfill this role. The church's policy is based on church law Canon 873,874.

First of all, only one male and/or one female sponsor may fill the role. To be admitted to the role of godparent, one must have completed their sixteenth year and have received the Sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist. He or she may NOT be the parent of the child to be Baptized. Our pastor, father Ring requires the Sponsors to obtain from their respective pastors a statement that he or she fulfills the requirements to be a Sponsor (godparent).

Parents and godparents are to receive instruction about their responsibility and the meaning and significance of the Sacrament of Baptism before the child is Baptized. Every child has a right to receive the Sacrament of Baptism apart from the circumstances of the parents—for example parents are not married.

I outline the Church's policy in hope that it is informative and useful.

My Dear Friends in Christ,

Something that has been (and will, I think, continue to be) debated is the "nature" of Jesus. For centuries, theologians have ponder the question of "what



did he know, and when did he know it?" when it comes to the divinity and/or humanity of Jesus. Some "camps" will say that Jesus always knew He was divine; some will place this knowledge at the point when He was found in the temple by Mary and Joseph; some will say that He had some knowledge early, and that He "grew" into full understanding when He started His public ministry.

Certainly, when Jesus encounters the Jewish crowds in today's gospel passage, He has full knowledge of who He is. In this continuation of the "Bread of Life discourse" (found in the sixth chapter of John's gospel, and the source of our gospel for the last few weeks), Jesus declares Himself as having come "down from heaven" (Jn 6:41). The Jewish audience (who has been following Him) are surprised (one might even say shocked) to hear this. They know Jesus to be the son of Joseph and Mary; they know His relatives (especially John the Baptist); they know His background – or at least they *think* they do. This encounter is much like when Jesus goes back to Nazareth, where the people "knew him when..." Much like that encounter, they feel they have Jesus all figured out.

There's only one problem with that logic: they're only seeing one "side" (the humanity) of Jesus. I say "side" because to speak of Jesus, one must walk a "theological tightrope". One cannot give too much weight to either the divinity or humanity of Jesus; they are equal in measure, equal in importance. Without divinity, there is no salvation; without humanity, there is no connection to you and meboth are necessary for us to have any chance at full redemption. While it is true that God could have saved us anytime, any way, anywhere, God chose Jesus (with the fullness of humanity and divinity) to be among us, similar to us in all things but sin. In this way, "one of our own" saved us. This is where it gets tricky for the Jewish audience: according to tradition, no one is supposed to know the origins of the Messiah – but they know Jesus' roots. This is not so important for us as Christians (we should be happy that God loves us so much that He gave us Jesus as savior and messiah!), but it is a major issue for the Jewish audience of the day (and continues to be a point of division between Christians and Jews).

Today's passage gives us hope, both for today and for the future. Today's hope comes in the fact that Jesus gives us Himself as "food for the journey", spiritual food that strengthens our souls. Future hope comes in the fact that Jesus came "down from heaven" (Jn 6:41), showing us the way to the Kingdom, and that with this "Bread of Life" we will live forever. May we come to know, appreciate and share this life, this life in Christ, with all whom we meet.


MEAT RAFFLE SEPTEMBER 29TH AT 1 PM

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Building on the development of Catholic Church teaching against capital punishment, Pope Francis has ordered a revision of the Catechism of the Catholic Church to assert "the death penalty is inadmissible because it is an attack on the inviolability and dignity of the person" and to commit the church to working toward its abolition worldwide.

The catechism's paragraph on capital punishment, 2267, already had been updated by St. John Paul II in 1997 to strengthen its skepticism about the need to use the death penalty in the modern world and, particularly, to affirm the importance of protecting all human life.

Announcing the change Aug. 2, Cardinal Luis Ladaria, prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, said, "The new text, following in the footsteps of the teaching of John Paul II in 'Evangelium Vitae,' affirms that ending the life of a criminal as punishment for a crime is inadmissible because it attacks the dignity of the person, a dignity that is not lost even after having committed the most serious crimes."

PATRON SAINT FOR PURGATORY?

Q. Is there a patron saint for the souls in purgatory? (Columbus, Ohio)

A. Two saints in particular are often invoked on behalf of the souls in purgatory. One is St. Nicholas of Tolentino, a 13th-century Augustinian priest, and the other is St. Gertrude the Great, a 13th-century Benedictine nun.

Not long after his ordination, Nicholas had a striking dream in which a deceased Augustinian appeared to him and begged his prayers to be released from the "purifying torments" that he was undergoing. Nicholas spent that night in prayer and then offered his Masses during the following week for the suffering priest.

A short time later, that same priest appeared again and assured Nicholas that he had been released from purgatory. As a result, prayers for the departed souls became a distinguishing feature of Nicholas' spirituality and ministry.

Gertrude the Great was one of the earliest mystics to whom Jesus encouraged devotion to his Sacred Heart. According to tradition, Gertrude was told by the Lord that the recitation of a particular short prayer would result in the immediate release of 1,000 souls from purgatory.

That supposed promise, however, appears nowhere in the recorded writings of Gertrude; and in the late 1890s, the Holy See challenged a rash of holy cards then being released with false promises and indulgences. The Vatican declared that any prayers guaranteeing the automatic release of a specific number of souls from purgatory were "apocryphal" and should be rejected by the faithful.

The feast of All Souls is celebrated by the universal church on Nov. 2, and countless Catholics pray for them regularly, especially during the month of November.

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
