


DEACON BRENDAN'S CORNER

We all can agree that the Holy Eucharist is the center of our Catholic faith. This is why we are asked to participate in Mass at least every Sunday. As a minister of Communion, I have observed many, many of the Catholic faithful show a need for instruction on how to approach the minister of Holy Communion and how to properly receive Holy Communion.

Although a line is formed, we are not lining up to receive but we are processing to the Sanctuary as a people of faith always moving forward in procession to the Lord. Therefore, it is NOT time to greet friends or shake hands, but rather a time to focus our eyes on the Crucifix.

There are two ways one may receive Holy Communion, either on the tongue or on the hand. They are equally proper and reverent ways of receiving Our Lord. To receive on your tongue, stick your tongue out far enough displaying it as a throne. If you are receiving in your hand place your non-dominant hand above your dominant hand so that you may transfer the Communion from your non dominant hand with your dominant hand and place the Eucharist in your mouth. Of course, the communicant's response to "The Body of Christ, is "Amen"

If you chose to receive the Precious Blood, accept the Chalice carefully holding it with two hands. When we are presented with the Precious Blood, we answer "Amen" to "The Blood of Christ. "Both forms are the full presence of Our Lord in the Eucharist. They are each a sign of Our Lord's full presence.

My Dear Friends in Christ,

One of my great joys is giving our young people an appreciation, if not understanding, of the Eucharist. It can be challenging, however, especially when one gets to the part about it being the actual Body and Blood of Christ. This is understandable, given that even the people of Jesus' day had a hard time getting a "handle" on it. Jesus, in speaking of the Eucharist as "flesh" and "blood", confounds the hearers in His presence. It can leave us in a bit of a lurch as well, given that we are not cannibals!

Jesus, in today's gospel, continues the "Bread of Life" discourse found in the sixth chapter of John's gospel. In this chapter, Jesus seeks to help the listener understand that true, full and real life comes when we consume His flesh and drink His blood. In fact, Jesus makes it clear that "unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink His blood, you do not have life within you" (Jn 6:53). This is one of those "hard teachings" of Jesus whereby He separates the true believers from those who are just around because Jesus is the "latest 'thing'". It is this teaching, and others like it, that establishes Jesus' credentials as the Messiah. In this gospel passage, Jesus looks to use this "Bread of Life" discourse to help His followers to have something which will sustain them after His death.

The Eucharist is the central teaching of the Catholic faith. It is, as the Catechism calls it, the "source and summit of the Christian life" (CCC, 1324, "Lumen Gentium", 11). It is thus and so because it makes us who we are; it feeds and sustains us and gives us "food for the journey". It is the Eucharist (a word which means "blessing" or "thanksgiving") that helps us understand God's goodness to us. Jesus, in today's gospel, refers back to the Exodus "event" in which God, through Moses, gives the Israelite community "manna", bread from heaven, which sustains them for their journey. We, for our part, have something greater than manna, for we have the "Real Presence", the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Our Lord, Jesus Christ. It is this gift, freely given and received in love, that helps us to live out the Christian life.

May we have the humility to receive this gift of life from Christ in a spirit of thanksgiving. May we know that it IS Christ that we are receiving, nothing less than Jesus' ACTUAL Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. May we have the courage to let that gift "take root" and "bear great fruit".




MEAT RAFFLE SEPTEMBER 29TH AT 1 PM

WHY I BELIEVE IN GOD By FATHER RON ROLHEISER

I believe that God exists, not because I have never had doubts, or because I was raised in the faith by persons whose lives gave deep witness to its truth, or because perennially the vast majority of people on this planet believe in God. I believe that a personal God exists for more reasons than I can name: the goodness of saints; the hook in my own heart that has never let me go; the interface of faith with my own experience, the courage of religious martyrs throughout history; the stunning depth of Jesus' teachings; the deep insights contained in other religions, the mystical experience of countless people; our sense of connection inside the communion of saints with loved ones who have died; the convergence of the anecdotal testimony of hundreds of individuals who have been clinically dead and resuscitated back to life; the things we sometimes intuitively know beyond all logical reason; the constant recurrence of resurrection in our lives; the essential triumph of truth and goodness throughout history; the fact that hope never dies, the unyielding imperative we feel inside of ourselves to be reconciled with others before we die; the infinite depth of the human heart; and, yes, even the very ability of atheists and agnostics to intuit that somehow it still all makes sense, points to the existence of a living, personal God.

I believe that God exists because faith works; at least to the extent we work it. The existence of God proves itself true to the extent that we take it seriously and live our lives in face of it. Simply put, we're happy and at peace to the exact extent that we risk, explicitly or implicitly, living lives of faith. The happiest people I know are also the most generous, selfless, gracious, and reverent persons I know. That's no accident.
