MASSES FOR THE WEEK A NOTE FROM THE PASTOR



Thanksgiving is right around the corner.

There will be a Thanksgiving Mass celebrated at Saint John's on Thanksgiving Morning at 8:00 AM

December 8th falls on a Sunday this year. We normally celebrate the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary

This year it will be celebrated on December 9th And is NOT a Holy Day of Obligation; however, Mass will be celebrated at 9:00 at Saint Ann's

My Dear Friends in Christ,



Hal Borland, the American author, was once quoted as saying that "knowing trees, I understand the meaning of patience; knowing grass, I can appreciate persistence". What he speaks of regarding trees and grass can be said about prayer. The elements of both patience and persistence are found in a good, rich prayer life. One may not see one's prayers answered in the time frame or fashion that they would like, but that doesn't mean that those prayers go unanswered. I once heard a priest say that "God answers all prayers – sometimes that answer is 'no". God knows what we need to grow in faith, hope and love. God also knows those things that we *need* (as opposed to praying for or expecting only those things we *want*).

In today's gospel, Jesus recounts the parable of the persistent woman and the dishonest judge. The woman is persistent in her prayer and the judge fears that her persistence will be transformed into anger or, worse yet, violence. It is by this persistence that the woman has her "day in court" (literally and figuratively). She is heard not because of any fear the judge has for God or people, but out of fear that the judge has in potentially losing his life. At the center of this "change of heart" is the persistence of the woman; she is relentless in her pursuit of a just verdict. Her persistence wins her the day.

Jesus tells us to take a lesson from this parable, namely to be persistent in prayer. Jesus' challenge to the hearer of this parable comes from both His desire for people to develop a relationship with God and His fear that people will lose faith if they don't remain diligent in their prayer. Jesus wonders aloud that when He comes back "will he find faith on earth?" (Lk 18:8). Jesus knows how easily people's faith can be shaken. Jesus has seen this doubt and fear in others and He will see it in His own disciples (at the end of His earthly days). Jesus knows the only way that people can be ready for trials and tribulations is by developing and maintaining a solid prayer life. This requires both persistence and patience.

This persistence and patience can overcome spiritual fatigue. In the first reading, as Joshua leads the Israelites into battle, with Moses leading the "spiritual warfare". As long as Moses was persistent, and didn't let weariness overcome him (with a little "assist" from Aaron and Hur), the Israelites had the better of the fight. The same can be true of us, as there are sometimes when we need support for our prayers. Thank God we have a community of believers, a family of faith to whom we can turn for such support (or whom we can support). In this way, we all grow closer to God in prayer and life. May we have the courage to be persistent in prayer, diligent in life. May we know that God is with us, hearing our prayers and giving us what we need to grow in faith, hope and love.

Rosary for Vocations — Saturday, November 9, 2019 — Noon — at Saint Ann's

Hi there.

We are all members of the Body of Christ, Saint Paul wrote in his first letter to the Corinthians (I Cor. 12:12). Yes, but usually *I* don't consider myself to be a particularly important part of the Body. I'm kind of an explorer, trekking ahead to learn more about God's presence and healing love, sharing it with those who come along with me. Looking around, however, I see other much more "important" people on the ecclesial scene than myself.



How about you? Do you consider your vocation to be important—necessary, even, for the life and holiness of the Church today? Do you live as though you were certain *you* are the light of the world?

Today's newsletter is about two saints who lived everyday lives in vocations to which God called them. When St. Gianna wife, mother, beloved pediatrician—was in the office or cooking dinner, she probably wasn't thinking, "I'm contributing to the holiness of the Church." I can't imagine St. Francis saying anything similar in those early years of trying to respond to the call of God (which eventually led to the immense number of women and men in the Franciscan Family today); all he started with was restoring a simple country church.

Yet both these people focused on one thing: responding to the voice of God leading them in their life. They allowed the goodness within them to be unburied, clarified, and to unfold into a life that was beautiful, powerfully attractive, and a gift to the Church and others.

What does St. Gianna have to do with St. Francis? They are united by the joy they took in God's creation, and united too in rising to the challenges set before them.

My friend, *you* are as necessary in the life and holiness of the Church as they are. If we don't believe this, we will not rise to the challenges that are specific to our day and age. You and I have been put here at this time by God because we have some work to do, some gift to give. St Gianna and St Francis teach us that it is the fidelity to our vocations that hones that gift and makes it possible to accomplish the work that is ours with serenity and grace.

May we all rise—not to the *occasion*—but in our own *personal* response to the voice of God who calls us individually and all together with Christ to be the light of the world today.



EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

Where Is the Evidence?

The US Bishops' pastoral letter, "Stewardship: A Disciple's Response," sees a life of stewardship as the fruit that comes from an authentic life with Jesus. Faith in Jesus is the minimum requirement that begins this journey from discipleship to stewardship living. There are those who believe in Jesus but do not know him. It becomes very hard to contemplate responding to the call of someone you do not know.

The last sentence of Luke 18:8 should give a reason to pause and reflect. Jesus says to his disciples, "But when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on Earth?" We can easiy respond affirmatively to the question, but if we want to look at the Earth ourselves without being able to see into people's hearts, where is the evidence of the faith that Jesus seeks? When we look at our world, do we see evidence of large amounts of faithful people living in a way that faith would lead them to live?

Our stewardship way of life is evidence of our faith. It is hard to argue that one truly has faith if they do not seek to live as Jesus calls us. An unfortunate cycle is then created when those who not believe do not see any reason to have faith. Our stewardship is not only evidence, but it is our testimony and witness to faith. If Jesus returned today, what would he see? Where is your evidence? Has your witness brought others to him?

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


October 20: Twenty-ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time
