



#### My Dear Friends in Christ,

Poet and novelist Vanna Bonta was once quoted as saying that she considers herself "more exportant than important". Forgiving her the act of making up a word, her point is well taken, especially in light of today's readings. The readings for this weekend are all about service, discipleship and the act of putting oneself second to the needs of others.

In the first reading, taken from the Acts of the Apostles, we recall the institution of the diaconate. As our own Deacon Joe can tell you, the deaconate is a ministry of service. It was "created" because there were members of the community (widows) whose basic human needs were not being met. This did not sit well with the Hellenists who were, to say the least, skeptical of this "New Way" (as Christianity was first called). In calling together the seven mentioned in today's reading, the basic needs of service were met while the prayer of the others could be undertaken. This is not to say that prayer was more important than service; in fact, guite the opposite. The ministry of the deaconate was established because service to the community was vitally important to its wellbeing. In this way, Jesus' command to care for the "least" among us would be met.

In our second reading, we see how our lives of discipleship rest on the "cornerstone" (1 Pt 2:6) who is Christ. This "living stone, rejected by human beings but chosen and precious in the sight of God" (1 Pt 2:4), is the "template" by which we are to model our lives. We all belong to the "priesthood of the baptized", and as such are called to model our lives after the "great High Priest" who is Christ. His priesthood was one of service, and ours must be as well. If we are to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, we must put our needs, wants and desires second to those of the community.

In our gospel passage, we hear of how the works that we do mirror our faith in God, It is not that we can ever "earn" our way into heaven, but the works we do show our faith in the One who instills in us the will to respond to God's call to serve our brothers and sisters. Last month, a number of our young people said "yes" to God in a very particular way by receiving the Gifts of the Holy Spirit in the Sacrament of Confirmation. In doing this, they publicly proclaimed their willingness to undertake a life of service in, and for, the Church. In preparing for this sacrament, they undertook various service projects, serving the needs of their brothers and sisters in our local communities.

May we all hear and respond to God's call to serve His people. May we know that this call is the fulfillment of our baptismal call to put our needs second to that of our brothers and sisters. May we know the way to the Father by following Christ in all that we say, do and are by seeing the needs of our brothers and sisters, responding to those needs and always striving for the greater glory of God.
